In order that we may know how many carolers we'll have and to plan for lunch, please sign-up on a Sunday using the bulletin slip or contact the church office.



FROM OUR PASTOR

Last year we created our own Advent Devotional booklets. To the best of my knowledge, it was the first time we'd done so. I read mine over and over, shocked and awed at the wisdom and insight of this congregation. It felt like a breath of fresh air, a beacon of hope, to read your words. Because they were such a hit, we're making them again this year, and this year the theme is "Openings." It was great fun choosing scriptures that made space for consideration of openings and openness.

The idea has taken up residence within me. Openness: space, light, autonomy, movement, newness, creation, liberation, becoming, being, growth, hope, rest, de-burdening, welcome. These are things I yearn for. They are things humans need. They may be things we've not been getting enough of. We may be experiencing too much of entirely the opposite stuff.

Advent is a time for yearning, perhaps most concretely it is a time of yearning for hope. We re-enter the history of our faith, and re-member the yearning of our ancestors in faith for God to act to bring hope, justice, and restoration to the people. This can be done, today, without the need for a particularly vivid imagination. Advent is a time to express and live into our yearnings, complete with an expectation that they will be fulfilled.

In worship, we're going to play with themes of openness too: opening our hearts to gratitude, opening our souls to joy, opening our lives to God at play. Advent isn't only a time for yearning, it is a time for preparation – to get ready to see the wondrous ways God's love impacts the world. Opening our hearts, souls, and lives to gratitude, joy, and God at play seem like helpful ways to prepare ourselves to take note and celebrate what God is up to.

Each week of Advent we light a candle, building up to the day when we can light the Christ candle. While we know that God is present in the darkness as well as in the light, the symbolism of adding light becomes the symbolism of building up our hope in what God will do.

Every week, we make a little bit more space inside for God to be at work, and for ourselves to be at peace. Every week, we allow for a little bit more openness. Every week, we make space.

There is, of course, a very big difference between the quiet and contemplative season of Advent and the hyper (and loud!) consumerist season of Christmas surrounding the church. I've heard the latter referred to as "Consumerist," which I find helpful as a differentation. Consumerist runs from late October until December 25th, encompassing Advent. Christian Christmas, on the other hand, runs from December 25th to January 6th. It seems helpful that they don't overlap more, it helps us keep them separate. The hyper, loud, red and green one can be a whole lot of merry fun – and I'm a fan of fun. Enjoy the enjoyable parts!

However, I hope you won't lose Advent in the midst of it. The quiet season of preparation has a lot going for it too – the contemplation of openness for one. If you need some help entering fully into Advent, we have some devotionals to help you out.;)




Sunday, December 2

prelude will begin at 9:50.



The Rose Window

...........

The rose window was installed sometime around 1874, during the time the church building was constructed. In 1981, it was removed for cleaning and repairs, then reinstalled and covered with Lexan.

As with all rose windows, its shape is that of a wheel, with a hub and spokes, a reminder that rose windows were originally called wheel windows. A rose window is also referred to as a marigold window, for the rose is a symbol of Mary. In FUMC's rose window, the twelve spokes are a reminder of the twelve



Each of the four colors in the window—red. blue, green, gold—has its own symbolism. From a distance, some of the glass appears to be white, a color which stands for purity, light and joy. Red symbolizes blood, fire, Christian zeal and the Holy Spirit; blue represents heaven, truth and constancy. The red and blue combines to form violet, a symbol of penitence, mourning and royalty. Green symbolizes life, hope, nature and growth, while gold adds the qualities of glory and splendor to the meanings of white. The different colored lights in stained glass have different properties: white is piercing, blue is luminous and expansive, red contracts at a distance and gold remains stable. As daylight fades, red will turn black but blue will remain until all the light is gone.

Many years ago, the Rev. Leon Adkins, Sr., pastor at the time, preached a sermon on the rose window. His concluding remarks still hold

today: "It (Rose Window) testifies to the central mystery of life - the union of God and man. It radiates the reality of constancy and truth. It radiates the glory of love and suffering which shall bring the Gospel of our Lord into the fulfillment of humanity's direst need and highest hope!"



Book Discussion

On Saturday, January 12th, from 10am -noon, we will be sharing our thoughts on our current book choice *Out of Many Faiths* by Eboo Patel. It is a book

that explores religious diversity and the American promise. Robert Wuthnow writes that it is "A passionate response to the anti-Muslim, anti-immigrant, racist white nationalism that so deeply afflicts our nation." We are hoping the extra time over the holidays will allow more of us to pick up this book and read it, and join us as we gather to discuss this timely defense in support of religious diversity in our nation at a time when there is so much division between one another.

Bishop's Gathering on A Way Forward

Following the 2016 General Conference, the Commission on a Way Forward was formed to deliberate and help the General Conference address the issue of sexuality in The United Methodist Church. The Commission will present a report during a Special Session of the 2019 General Conference, which will be held February 23-26, 2019 in St. Louis, Missouri.

Upper New York Area Resident Bishop Mark J. Webb is hosting six gatherings around the Conference in preparation for Special Session of General Conference to talk about the report of the Commission on a Way Forward. In our area, a gathering will be held Sunday, Dec. 2nd, at Shenendehowa UMC, 971 Route 146 in Clifton Park, and will include a presentation of the plan and process of General Conference, and Worship.



Celebration!!!

2019 is the 25th anniversary of FUMC's efforts to become a reconciling congregation. Two years later after activities, discussions, and education which increased the understanding of members of the congregation, FUMC accepted the following statement: "We will continue to seek and welcome persons of any age, gender, race, ethnic background, sexual orientation, physical or mental ability as full participants in our community of faith." We desire to do a year-long celebration of this decision with a variety of activities throughout the year.

Most importantly, since the special session of the General Conference 2019 is 3 months away, what do we want to do to celebrate our own entry into the struggle against discrimination of LGBTQIA+ persons while the UMC will be in the midst of struggling over whether to become a less discriminatory denomination? (Sunday Feb.24, 2019 will be the first full day of the special session of General Conference.)

<u>Babyfold and Pre-K Ministry</u>—We are hoping to purchase some additional items and toys for this program within our church in response to all the new baby members within our congregation.

<u>Church World Service:</u> Blanket Program— A \$10 blanket supplies warmth to someone experiencing a crisis.

<u>FUMC SUSTAIN (Soap) Ministry</u> – Soap and other basic hygiene products are not covered by food stamps. Any size donation will help with the hygiene of needy Schenectadians.

<u>Heifer International</u> – "The gift that multiplies." Animals and training in their care are given worldwide. Recipients give the first offspring to someone else, thereby spreading the gift. Any donation is helpful, but you have the option of "buying" specific animals.

<u>Home Furnishings Program</u> of Schenectady County – This organization recycles furniture by giving donated furniture and other household items to people in need, who have been referred by agencies in the county.

<u>Community Breakfast Program</u> — This program is held at our church each Sunday except on the first Sunday of each month to provide a good breakfast and hospitality to the people of Schenectady.

Checks can be made out to FUMC with a notation of the agency to which you are donating. Or you can donate directly to the agency for GE or other matching. Cards, which you can give to the person you are honoring, are available in narthex/lobby.

We hope you will consider this meaningful way to share love at Christmas.

▶ Union College Protestant Ministry

Delivered on November 11, 2018, by Rev. Heather Kirk-Davidoff, guest presenter

- Hi everyone, my name is Heather Kirk-Davidoff and I am currently serving as the Interim Campus Protestant Minister at Union College. Union College, as you may know, does not employ a chaplain. Instead, I am part of an interfaith group of seven chaplains who serve the religious and spiritual needs of students on campus. All of us are supported and funded by congregations, denominations and individuals, not by the college itself.
- That's where you come in! CPM has a long and strong connection to this congregation. For many years you have blessed us with funds from your outreach budget. In addition, two members of this congregation serve on our board: Bob Long, who has served our board for several decades, and Elaine Troy who serves as our Treasurer.
- My main purpose this morning is to say thank you. We quite simply could not do what we do without you.
- Some of you may have known my predecessor, Viki Brooks, who retired this past June after 20 years at Union. One of the pieces of advice that Viki gave me when I started was to be sure to read Pastor Sara's message in the First United Methodist newsletter. It was good advice! This past week, Sara wrote about the stages of theological thought as described by Marcus Borg. First comes pre-critical naivete, then comes critical thinking, and then comes post-critical naivete. (It makes me feel very academic just to say those terms out loud!)



 The work of campus ministry is basically to accompany students as they travel back and forth between these stages of theological thought. Our aim is not to push a student to get to a different stage--to question more, or to question less--but rather to be lovingly and enthusiastically present with them, wherever they may be.



- This past week, at our last Tuesday night Dinner and Discussion of the term, I asked the students why they keep showing up each week. Was is just the free food? They responded that our discussions, led by students, are unique on campus. "We have debates in class all the time," one student explained, "but they are always in response to other people's statements or findings or analysis. This is really the one place where we can ask our own questions."
- How fitting that this congregation supports that kind of conversation for Union students!
 Thank you for being my partner--and theirs--as we navigate the sometimes rocky road towards living a faithful life in this moment in history.

▶ Coffee Fellowship

Good morning! Today I would like to tell you about one of the most important ministries of FUMC. It is our weekly Coffee Fellowship that happens each Sunday after the service. I learned many years ago that Coffee is Methodist Holy Water!

Why do we have this time together? Just for that reason. It gives us all an opportunity to chat with each other, greet visitors, and, for me, give Rudy a kiss on the cheek.

Why is this time important? Well, the sanctuary is very large. Personally, I find it tricky to greet people, as we are scattered about. As we learned from Pastor Sara at the Church Council meeting, our Limbic System is soothed by interpersonal relationships. This system of our bodies controls the basic emotions (fear, pleasure, anger). If we are feeling anxiety, loneliness, sadness, or grief, for instance, we can be soothed by being with our fellow parishioners. You see, we need each other! And, of course, a cup of coffee or tea!



The group of people who prepare the Coffee Fellowship need more help. It is quite easy to set the refreshments up. There is a Bunn coffee maker in the kitchen, and a clear set of instructions on how to operate it. Kettles for heating water for tea are available. The supplies are stored in the cupboard in the coat closet in Wesley Lounge. Preparation takes about 30-35 minutes, with break down about the same amount of time. It works best with a team of 2.

If you are interested in joining this important ministry, please talk to me. We will train you! There will be a sign-up sheet on the table during the Coffee Fellowship time.

The big deal: if you join the group, you get your own little key to the coffee cupboard!!!!
