# **From Our Pastor**



I recently attended a workshop with the Samaritan Counseling Center about change. The basic premise of the workshop was that we cannot simply will ourselves to change with exertions of self-control and discipline. Rather, we have to see why we do what we do now, and what benefits we gain from the current situation so that we can take that into consideration as we think about how to create sustainable change. For example, we were asked to think of something we wish we did differently and

then consider why we don't! I chose the fact that my desk is a MESS. There are piles of paperwork in every direction from my computer. However, I realized there are two perfectly good reasons for this: 1. Pretty much everything else I do takes priority over cleaning my desk because it all feels more important. 2. Cleaning my desk requires making many (many!) decisions about what to keep and how. Most of the time, I've already used up my decision making energy on other things I find more important before I get to the desk.

Before you worry about my desk too much, please know that one among you often helps me out, and once in a great while I find it cathartic to sort despite the above. This most often happens before Holy Week when I'm procrastinating more difficult tasks.

Back to the main point though, chance doesn't happen by force of will. It does happen organically at times though. Chance is one of those forces of life that comes whether we are ready or not, and when things change around us, we adapt. This is true in our individual lives as well as in our life together as a Body of Christ. I've been thinking about this because starting January 1<sup>st</sup> we have some significant leadership transitions. This means that we have a chance to express our gratitude to those who have served our community well in leadership, and offered their gifts and their presences to us (often for a LOOOONG time). It also means we have the chance to celebrate the willingness of those taking on new roles and their gifts and presences in our midst.

We are experiencing transition in the roles of:

- —Co-Lay Leader: Jean Gustafson is finishing her term and Sylvester Doyer is starting his.
- —Trustee's Chair: Anne Phillips is finishing her term and Trustees will elect a replacement in January.
- —Staff Pastor Parish Relations Chair: Mary Ann Marshall is finishing her term and Beth Bonacquist is starting hers.
- —Welcoming Ministries Co-Chair: Kristen Johnson is finishing her term and Mary Ann Marshall is starting hers
- —Banking Team: Lois and Bill Isles are finishing a "term" of several decades and Ernie Readdean is starting a new term.

In addition, we reconstructed our Children and Youth Ministries Team to fit our current realities. These are real changes. They're the changes of organic life together, many things will stay the same, little things may change, and those little things may leader to bigger change. We have also been briefed by the Finance Committee that the ways we have been doing ministry are not financially sustainable and we are going to need to be creative and careful in finding ways to continue God's work in this place in some new ways.

Change doesn't come by the force of will, but it can come through careful listening or by changing circumstances. Thanks be to God who is always with us, and guiding us in our lives together. May we find ways to make changes that are necessary and hold on to what shouldn't be changed – yet.







# SAVE THE DATE!!! Intergenerational Volunteers in Mission Trip!!

FUMC will sponsor a second annual (?) intergenerational VIM trip to Mission Central in Mechanicsburg, PA, during the schools' Easter vacation. Dates will be Mon. April 22 – April 26 or 27 (to be determined). Everyone who went last year came back enthused about what they had learned and accomplished and about the facility where they stayed.

Mission Central (https://missoncentral.org) is a United Methodist depot near Harrisburg, PA. Supplies are collected there and then distributed to those who need them, usually after a disaster. Supplies include flood (cleaning) buckets, hygiene kits, school kits, layettes, and more. Volunteers help to prepare the kits for distribution.

The group will stay at The Silver Spring Retreat Center in Mechanicsburg (www.silverspring.org/silverspringretreatcenter). A

"tourist" event will be included in the trip with a visit to either Gettysburg National Military Park or Steamtown National Historic Site.

# Mission Moment Delivered during Worship

#### ► Alternative Gifts

Delivered on December 2, 2018, by Jan Huston

Many of us have way too much stuff. Many others don't have what they need. So the idea of giving alternative gifts was conceived. You know the basics – Instead of giving a material thing to someone who really doesn't need it (and might not even want or like it), we can give an alternative gift. We can give a monetary gift in honor of the person who doesn't need more stuff!

There are many worthwhile causes needing financial help. I was amazed at the number of requests I got on Giving Tuesday. The Intersectional Justice Committee has chosen 6 which we hope you will consider using to honor some people on your gift lists.

<u>Heifer International</u> gives animals and training to people all over the world. The recipient of an animal is expected to give the first offspring to someone else. So it is "the gift that multiplies." I recently read a book named "Half the Sky." It describes the terrible lives of women in some parts of the world. The last chapter lists ways we can help. Heifer is one of them.

<u>Church World Service</u> is another organization that works in many ways in many countries. Mary Anderson and I met one of their agricultural program people when we were in rural Nicaragua! One of their programs is to give blankets to people who are suffering from disasters. Only \$10 will provide a good warm blanket to someone who needs it. A sample blanket is in the narthex.

Home Furnishings Program is a Schenectady program that was started over 30 years ago by Church Women United. It's an ecumenical program with a small staff and many volunteers. People donate good used furniture and other household items. People who need them are screened and referred by community agencies. Our church houses the office and Elsie's room. Elsie's room is where smaller items like kitchen supplies and linens are kept and distributed. There is a warehouse in Schenectady for larger items.

We've chosen 3 of our own church's programs to highlight, too.

The <u>Community Breakfast Program</u> offers a free breakfast to anyone in the community every Sunday except the first Sunday of each month. The number of people served ranges from about 65 to more than a hundred on any given Sunday. The program is supported by grants, a small amount in our church budget, donations, and many volunteers.



FUMC's <u>Sustain Ministry</u> grew out of our former Soap and Toilet Paper ministry. Soap, diapers, toilet paper, and basic hygiene items are not covered by food stamps. These basic supplies are given to approximately 120 families every month. This program also receives a small amount in our church budget and benefits from donations and many volunteers. When I was finding out how many people were served, I was asked to also say that there is a need for more volunteers. You might consider spending a few hours sorting diapers or other supplies as an alternative gift instead of or in addition to giving money.

We are glad that our <u>Babyfold and Pre-K Ministry</u> is growing! The babyfold room is getting painted and spruced up and we are asking for donations for some new items and toys to help children be more able to enjoy their first church experience.

There is a table in the narthex with a display about all of these projects with cards that you can give to someone to let them know of a donation you have given in their honor. Our church secretary, Linda Smith, made all of the cards except those for Heifer and Church World Service. We're pleased with the results!!

You can give to any of these programs by making out a check to the church and putting the name of the program in the notation. Or you can give directly to an organization if that would enable GE matching.

We hope you will celebrate this season of giving by considering one or more of these worthwhile programs.
