### **From Our Pastor**



I'm writing to you from the gate area of the Albany airport, waiting for the flights that will take me to St. Louis for the Special Session of General Conference for The United Methodist Church. At the special session, The Church will decide whether or not it is big enough to welcome all of God's beloved people. (Currently it is not, and excludes people who are LGBTQIA+ from full participation.) Along with MANY others, I've been working towards full inclusion of LGBTQIA+ people for as long as I can remember, and I've been working on the Love Your Neighbor Strategy team for 4.5 years to try to influence this decision.

Until very recently, I was able to push past my nerves about this General Conference. I just did the work and kept focused. A few days ago something shifted in me. (I blame prayer.) I realized how grief-stricken I am to be part of a church that does such profound harm. I let myself think about how the church that has loved me into being who I am, and taught me of the God of love, has been the same one who has told countless others that they're not worthy of the same love. I've listened to queer and trans friends and church members and heard a refrain of "how long, O Lord?"

By the time you read this, General Conference will be over, and what is going to happen from my perspective will have happened. Whatever it is, we are having a service of healing and communion on March 3<sup>rd</sup> to shake the dust off our feet.

Right now, my anxiety is HIGH. My head aches, my attention span is a joke, and I keep searching for meaning and answers that simply aren't there. At the same time, I am aware that this General Conference is not about me, I'm not in the center, and my work is actually one of support for those who are in the center.

It is hard to feel this nervous and keep track of perspective and compassion. I keep asking for God's help with it. At the same time, I've been taught by Family Systems Theory that the first job of a leader is to manage their own anxiety so they don't pass it on and through the organization they manage.

So, for others who are feeling anxiety, and I can think of plenty of reasons why people might, I offer some of the skills I've been reminding myself in order to manage it:

- Drink plenty of water
- Eat healthily, even when you don't want to
- Exercise, preferably outside (which ice doesn't help with)
- Engage in open, honest, direct communication remember that secrets build anxiety!
- Pay attention to breathing
- Spiritual practices can transform moments, days, even lives
  - Centering prayer is very important for me right now
- Acknowledge the anxiety both to myself and to others
- Ask "what is it I'm so afraid of" and "how likely is that to happen, really?"
- Consider "what power do I have to change this?" (if some, do it, if none, don't.)
- Slow things down: Anxiety can lead us to make HUGE leaps in logic, and thus can preference us towards jumping to conclusions. Act slowly when possible.
- Remember the people and things that make you laugh, and seek them out
- Pay attention to the good, and to your gratitude for the good. Gratitude can change everything. (For example, I'm thrilled with people I'm expecting to see in St. Louis, and I'm so grateful I get to come home to all of you.)

From what I can tell, God needs our righteous indignation in the face of injustice, but also needs our laughter and joy in the face of delight. Peter Carmen, pastor at Emmanuel Friedens, recently told me that his impoverished Christian friends in Latin America are the happiest people he knows. He asks them how they can do that, when they face such oppression, and they tell him "They have taken everything else away, why would we give them our joy too?"

Amen to that!!! May we live in this world with our eyes open to see the brokenness, to call it to account, to transform the world to love – but may we find God's joy while we do it. It matters!

#### **Gather for Book Discussion**

"The Soul of America:
The Battle for Our Better Angels"
by Jon Meacham

On Saturday, April 6, at 10 AM, a book discussion will be held on "The Soul of America: The Battle for Our Better Angels" by Jon Meacham. Named one of the best books of the year by NPR in 2018. Our current climate of partisan fury is not new, and in The Soul of America Meacham shows us how what Abraham Lincoln called the "better angels of our nature" have repeatedly won the day. Painting surprising portraits of Lincoln and other presidents, and illuminating the courage of such influential citizen activists as Martin Luther King, Jr., Meacham brings vividly to life turning points in American history. While the American story has not always—or even often-been heroic, we have been sustained by a belief in progress even in the gloomiest of times. In this inspiring book, Meacham reassures us, "The good news is that we have come through such darkness before"—as, time and again, Lincoln's better angels have found a way to prevail. All are welcome...plan to pickup the book and attend the discussion.



Following the training, Stephen Ministers commit to serve faithfully for a period of no less than two years.

Primetimers is a program of the General Board of Global Ministries of the United Methodist Church. It offers educational and mission service experience for older adults. Exciting 5-10 day events offer opportunities for educational forums, cross-cultural exposure, faith-filled reflection, and greater exposure to the work of the United Methodist Church and the church universal. Primetimers' events are designed with less strenuous events than the traditional UMVIM teams. They continue to include peace and poverty, history, sustainability of resources, and living with and loving those of different cultural backgrounds. Primetimers information is available at https://www.umcmission.org.

#### Two new trips are planned for 2019:

▶ The first trip is a Hands-on Cultural Exchange to Prague and Pilsen in the Czech Republic Sept. 6—16. The focus will be on learning about the history of the United Methodist Church (UMC) in the Czech Republic as well as sharing in the mission work there. In Prague, a theology professor at Charles University will share a presentation about the history of Methodists in the Czech Republic and the John Wesley connection. The group will tour several Methodist churches, including an English speaking congregation, and participate in their outreach and worship service. They will tour Prague Castle, St. Vitus Cathedral, Charles Bridge, the Old Jewish Cemetery, Old Town Square with the astronomical clock, the National Museum, and more.

In Pilsen, Primetimers will visit with members of a Methodist Church, their preschool and after-school programs, Bible study, lunch programs, and a drug and alcohol rehab center. They will engage in ministry alongside their partners as invited. They will also tour the famous Pilsner Urquell Brewery, St. Bartholomew's Cathedral, the Great Synagogue, Republic Square, The General Patton Museum, Karlstejn Castle, and the Underground Tunnels. The group will share in a cooking exchange class where they will learn to prepare a traditional Czech meal and Primetimers will prepare a Tex-Mex meal for the hosts. Housing will be in hotels in both cities. Cost is \$1550 per person and does not include airfare to and from Prague.

The second trip is to Paducah, KY, Oct. 1—8. It is entitled "Come to the Rivers: Faith on the Inland Waterway." The focus will be on Kentucky's Appalachian Mountain heritage. The group will learn about the rich river culture that is headquartered in Western KY where the Mississippi, Ohio, Tennessee, and Cumberland Rivers make their mark on the state. Native Americans used this region for religious ceremony and for burial. Frontier folks including Methodists Peter Cartwright, Harry Hoosier, and Francis Asbury found a fertile place for faith to grow near these waters. Modern religious expressions in the region are diverse and cross faith boundaries. The group will visit the Reelfoot Rural Ministry of New Harmony Historic District of Paducah, the Hotel Metropolitan, and the River Heritage Museum. They will connect with local churches in the region while discovering the distinctive faith of river communities and the river lore embodied in church life. They

will experience and contribute to the mission needs and life of the hub of America's inland

waterways. Housing will be in a local hotel. Cost is \$1000 per person.

A third opportunity is offered by Educational Opportunities. It is not an official Global Ministries event but is targeted to a similar group. Leaders have led many UMVIM teams. This is a Missions Cruise to the Caribbean in January 18-25, 2020. Stops will be in Puerto Rico, St. Thomas, the Dominican Republic, and the Bahamas. The stops will include visits to churches and mission sites as well as opportunities for sightseeing, enjoying beaches, shopping, deep-sea fishing, and lots more. Prices range from \$1299-\$2149. 
