## Lisa Vroman, Lyric Soprano Sunday, May 5, at 3 PM

Lisa Vroman, lyric soprano, will present a concert of songs ranging from Classics to Broadway in our sanctuary Sunday afternoon, May 5th, at 3:00 p.m. We are indeed pleased to welcome her to this final concert

of FUMC's 2018-2019 Concert Series. On stage and in concert, she has established herself as one of America's most versatile voices. She has been regarded as a "musical and theatrical marvel" by the San Francisco Chronicle, as well as "one of American Musical Theater's most beautiful voices" by Broadway producer Sir Cameron Mackintosh.

Ms. Vroman starred for over eight years as Christine in Phantom of the Opera on Broadway and in San Francisco and Los Angeles. She is a frequent guest soloist with theater and opera companies both in the United States and abroad, and has held lead roles in musicals and operas such as The Most Happy Fella, Kiss Me Kate, The King and I, The Sound of Music, Oklahoma!, HMS Pinafore, and Die Fledermaus, to name but a few. She has sung on separate occasions for Queen Elizabeth and several former presidents and had the honor of singing at the Profiles in Courage Award dinner in Boston at the JFK Library as a guest of the Kennedy family. Recently she performed with the Hong Kong Philharmonic and l'Opéra de Rennes in France, and gave a multi-city concert tour in China.

Ms. Vroman holds an undergraduate degree in Music Education as well as a recently awarded honorary Doctor of Music Degree, both from the Crane School of Music at Potsdam, and a Masters degree in Fine Arts, Opera Performance, from Carnegie Mellon University. She is an active mentor and clinician with many colleges and universities and recently joined the teaching faculty of the Institute for American Musical Theatre in New York City.

Her concert at FUMC will be in a casual, cabaret style (no tables and wine, just delightful music!). Sounds like fun, so come join us. As always, the concert is free and all are welcome to attend. ### From our Pastor



I've been obsessing a bit recently about an idea I came across in John Dominic Crossan's Who Killed Jesus: Exposing the Roots of Anti-Semitism in the Gospel Stories of The Death of Jesus. I quoted it in both the Palm Sunday and Easter Sermons. Crossan says that Jesus taught "that God has given all human beings the wisdom to discern how, here and now in this world, one can so live that God's power, rule, and domination are evidently present to all observers." It was presented, in the book, as a difference of "eschatologies" - namely that Jesus wasn't teaching that the world as it was known was going to end and God

was going to act to recreate it. Instead, Jesus was teaching that the kin(g)dom of God is here and now, and we already have what we need to participate in it. Further, by participating in it, we bring it more and more into existence for everyone.

It isn't entirely clear to me why this has drawn my attention so whole-heartedly, particularly because this isn't a new idea to me. I already knew that Jesus was about empowerment, and that the kin(g) dom is here and now, and that we as humans have the wisdom we need to respond to the situations we find ourselves in. Yet somehow, said the way Crossan says it, it feels new all over again. It reminds me of what I once read in some Buddhist books about each person having within them a "precious gem" of infinite worth that cannot, under any circumstances, be harmed or blemished, and that that gem offers wisdom. It strikes me, again, that this is the idea of soul in Christianity, and the soul is a source of wisdom.

One of our challenges in Christianity, though, is that so much of the dialog in the church as a whole has focused on purity culture, which assumes that a soul can be tainted or harmed. But that would be like harming or tainting God, since our souls are part of the Divine (I also think a very reasonable claim can be made that our bodies are too, that's for another day.)

The question that I keep coming back to is: how do we access the wisdom that we already have? On Easter I offered some of the teachings of Parker Palmer as an answer, and I stick by those. I'm also happy to offer more of that if any of you want, I LOVE the teachings of Parker Palmer. The good news is that there are multiple answers to this question, and asking it is part of how we find them!

Part of what souls need to feel safe in sharing their wisdom is a community that supports, loves, asks, and makes space. This means not only not judging (we're good at that) but also not trying to "fix" (oh my goodness so much harder)! I believe that we are that sort of community and are capable of learning even more skills to become more of it. It is sort of like how the kin(g)dom is here and is capable of being here more. Anyway, this is a great thing, because not every faith community is a place where people are loved and accepted as they are, and space is made for further development of authentic being. But we are! And loved, accepted people change the world.

I'm really supposed to have a point in these articles, and I fear this one is a bit weak in point. But what I'm trying to say (I think) is this: you are doing a great job and I'm delighted to be in ministry with you in building the kin(g)dom AND it is worth thinking about how to make space for your soul to shine through as a gift to other souls who are feeling shy. Let's keep working on it AND celebrating it.


### Schenectady CROP Walk Sunday, May 5

Communities Responding to Overcome Poverty

Roughly 1000 CROP Hunger Walks happen every year in the U.S.; the 5K walk symbolizes the daily journey many must make for clean water.

The walk kicks off at Emmanuel Friedens Church on Sunday, May 5th, at 2:00 after a brief opening ceremony (no long speeches!). Registration begins at 1:00. Food will be collected to help fill the food van. One quarter of the money raised supports local efforts to support hunger and poverty fighting programs; the rest is used by Church World Service, an ecumenical agency, to alleviate hunger throughout the world. 

### **Next Book Discussion** — Sunday, June 2



"The Underground Railroad: A Novel" will be discussed on Sunday, June 2, after Worship and the potluck lunch celebrating Christian Education Sunday. This book by Colson Whitehead is a Pulitzer Prize winner and a National Book Award winner as well as being recommended by Oprah's Book Club. It chronicles a young slave's adventures as she makes a desperate bid for freedom in the antebellum South. As Whitehead re-creates the terrors for black people in the pre-Civil War era, he seamlessly weaves the saga of the brutal importation of Africans to the unfulfilled promises of the present day. "The Underground Railroad" is at once a kinetic adventure of one woman's ferocious will to escape the horrors of bondage and a shattering, pow-

### **▶ United Methodist Social Principles 2020 Revision**

Delivered on Feb. 10, Mar. 17 & 31 and April 7, 14, 28, 2019, by Elaine Troy

Principles are norms, rules or values that represent what is desirable and positive for an organization. Principles help determine the rightfulness or wrongfulness of our actions as a church. Principles govern both policy and objectives.

### In April 2018

The United Methodist Church General Board of Church and Society, operating with the tag line "Living Faith, Seeking Justice and Pursuing Peace," released a Draft revision of the United Methodist Social Principles.

Over the next few months, we will be summarizing this DRAFT in Mission Moments, and inviting the congregation to think about the Social Principles as they apply to our community and congregation. We hope this is informative and thought provoking.

This document divides the Principles into 6 sections:


- THE COMMUNITY OF ALL CREATION
- THE NURTURING COMMUNITY
- THE SOCIAL COMMUNITY
- THE POLITICAL COMMUNITY
- THE ECONOMIC COMMUNITY
- THE WORLD COMMUNITY



Each of these Sections contains 10 or more subsections addressing what Lee Tupper might have called Prime Values. Since the document is so detailed, the congregation is encouraged to read the entire draft document at their leisure.

### **▶** United Methodist Camps

Delivered on March 10, 2019, by Pastor Sara

In the past few weeks I've been in some very sacred spaces filled with United Methodists who stand firmly in the grounding of God's love for ALL people. Last week, this was at the Love Your Neighbor Coalition worship the day after General Conference. This week it was yesterday, at an Upper New York gathering of those who want to organize for inclusion in our own conference.

One of the pieces that struck me in each of those gatherings were how many CAMP people were there. It was disproportionate, in each case. People I've known at camp, people I know who love other camps, camp people, are people who know a God of love, of inclusion, of radical hospitality, of Jesus as a radical faith leader calling for the well being of God's beloveds against systems that would oppress them.

Camp doesn't start out to create good theology. Camp starts out to provide a safe environment for campers to thrive, then adds to it nurture and fun, friendship and play, the wonder of creation, and time to simply be. Within all of that, at United Methodist Camps, is infused a sense of wonder of the God who loves us, a delight in creation as an expression of God, a chance to explore the Bible and get to know its curiosities, a space to ask deep questions, and enough time for the love of God's people to soak in far enough that the love of God can take hold too. Good theology is merely a normal outcome.



I loved camp as a kid. I was a very awkward kid, and although I was lucky to come from a loving home, I hadn't found acceptance at school when I started going to church camp. I did find acceptance at camp, and acceptance for many of the same things that kids at school teased me about. (Camp at its best celebrates people exactly where they are, like church.) That love soaked into me, and it stuck. I kept going to camp, and it was at camp that I started getting to ask big questions, and study big Biblical ideas, and build connections that would last.

Late on, I couldn't believe my good fortune when I was hired to work at camp after high school. That's when the deeper learning began – figuring out how diverse God's people really are, finding what challenged me, learning how deeply I could love, discovering how much I needed other people's help – and how much they needed mine – and finding out I could do many things I hadn't known I could. Later still, after I'd finished seminary and become a pastor, I got to take a try at directing, at being in charge at camp and making sure a whole camp full of people were doing well, all at once. That process has continued to stretch me, delight me, make me laugh, and give me space to grow. I'm 37, and I still go to camp every year, because my heart can't make it if I don't.

If you want to go to camp this year, I think you should take that seriously! For some, that may come in the form of our retreat at the end of the summer (it is handicap accessible), others may want to volunteer for a week (or a day), others still may want to be campers (the very best part) or simply drop off or pick up campers. Camp is one of the best expressions I know of the kindom come to life, and its well worth seeking out.
