### **From Our Pastor**



November will start, as it always does, with All Saint Sunday. The final Sunday of November this year will be our Worship celebration of Thanksgiving. The two fit together especially nicely, or especially terribly, depending on how deeply you are grieving. For those who have lost a loved one this year, the start of the holiday season is especially difficult. Many won't feel like "giving thanks," and it doesn't even feel honest to do so. For those a step further away from grief, starting the month giving thanks to God for those who inspired us, shared with us, and showed

us how to live fits perfectly. It means the month begins and ends with gratitude.

This year I've been thinking a lot about the ways that God's love is embodied in human love. This feels particularly true to me in faith community. The joy of being in church is knowing people who have devoted their lives to goodness, and getting to learn why they do what they do, and how I can do what I do better. Based on my experience, faith is inherently communal. I know what I know because I was taught it, sometimes with words. I do what I do because I am following what others did and I found worthwhile. As I get to know each person better, they inspire me and challenge me in new ways.

Thus I've been thinking of the church as a collection of "partners in building the kindom." I know my own limits, and I can only do a small part of the work of co-creating the kindom with God. By myself, I'd be easily swallowed up by the brokenness and lose hope. But none of us are by ourselves in this process. This is part of the point of church. We are hope for each other, we are reminders of God's goodness for each other, we are more together than the sum of our parts, and through each other we know and see God. While God is our co-creator, I like the idea that we are partners in building the kindom together.

My grandfather and his brother ran a seafood store together. I was quite small when they sold it, but have gotten curious about it in recent years. My father grew up working in the store, so when I ask him questions about who did what, he knows. He is also always 100% clear. Apparently the brothers had firm lines between them and their spheres of influence and life would not have worked any other way. They were brothers, partners, neighbors, and best friends – but that required clarity of roles.

At the same time, my co-dean and I at camp have really flexible role differentiation. Some things she takes the lead on, some things I do, but most of the time we are pretty interchangeable. Largely we alternate on whose turn it is to "be bad cop."

That is to say, there are a wide range of models of partnership, and the church really embodies the whole range. Some skills are super particular, and some roles are very clear, and sometimes things overlap and are fuzzy around the edges. That said, for many among us it can be hard to figure out where they belong. Years ago I was told, "your community is the place where your gifts are received." I love that. I think it is true! And we, as partners in building the kindom, need a wide range of gifts to enrich our work together.

We also may need to invite new partners into the work of building the kindom. Much like Jesus' line, "the harvest is plenty but the workers are few," I think there is a lot of work to do and many hands are most likely to make light work. Perhaps some don't know their gifts are needed, or welcome. That may include some already in our midst. If God is nudging you to share a gift, let me know. Partners in building the kindom are always welcome, and they bring gratitude to our lives and our hearts.


### **Advent Devotional**

# Mission Moments Delivered during Worship

### **▶ Volunteers In Mission & Early Response Team Opportunities**

Delivered on September 22, 2019, by Jan Huston

I want to tell you about 2 wonderful opportunities! One is free. The other is \$25 and includes lunch! Both are easy to get to!



Both of them are Volunteers-in-Mission opportunities. Most of you know something about VIM. Many of you have participated in VIM activities and know how rewarding they can be. But just in case you need a refresher, I think VIM is one of the best things about the United Methodist Church! You might have heard about teams doing heavy rebuilding and hard work after disasters. That's one kind of VIM team. Many are less strenuous! There is something for everyone!!

Our youth, with Sylvester and Cliff, did disaster recovery in NC in August. Other teams in the past have done similar work in NC, MS, WV, NJ, and more. Every Monday for several years Jim Troy, Jane Baker's late husband Dan, and my husband Pete went to Middleburgh, NY, with other United Methodists to rebuild after Tropical Storm Irene and Hurricane Sandy. In 2015, this church sent a team to Hogansburg, NY, near the Canadian border to build a ramp on a Methodist Church. Most of the members of that church are Mohawk Indians. They were very hospitable and shared their culture, food, and friendship. Twice we have sent intergenerational teams to Mission Central in PA to help sort disaster supplies. Thoughts are beginning about sending an intergenerational team to Puerto Rico in 2020. If you'd like to consider that, talk with Sylvester or me.

Since 1988 (or 87) members of this church have participated in 10 or 11 teams to Nicaragua. (The history is fuzzy.) The work has included building homes after a hurricane or just because they were needed, health care, health education, building a community center, learning about coffee growing, building a place for high-risk pregnant women, and always forming friendships. Sandy George, who is here today and usually goes to Emmanuel/Friedens, spent several years working in Nicaragua with her husband John Detwyler. They introduced us to Belinda and her wonderful agency – Acción Médica Cristiana. Our teams have been privileged to be able to work with her. And now our church is fortunate to have a covenant relationship with Belinda.

So – back to the current opportunities! Trainings will be available Nov. 2 and 3 at Shenendehowa UMC. One is for being part of an Early Response Team (ERTs). ERTs go in soon after a disaster as self-contained teams to do the initial clean-up – mucking out, dealing with mold, putting tarps on homes, etc. Team members must be 18 years old. Specialized training will be on Sat. Nov. 2 at Shenendehowa, costs \$25 and includes lunch. Volunteers-in-Mission team leader training will be on Sun.

afternoon Nov. 3 at Shenendehowa and is free. Interested and experienced people are invited to attend even if they might not want to become leaders. Registration for both is due by Oct. 15. Details about the trainings and about registration are in the bulletin and the Spire, or you can talk with me.

I'm afraid I've gone over the 3 minutes allowed for a mission moment, but VIM has enriched our lives and been so meaningful for those of us who have participated that I hope it's worth an extra minute of your time. And I hope you will follow up and participate in these life-changing experiences.

### **▶ Social Principles**

Delivered on September 29, 2019, by Jan Huston

Last Spring, Elaine shared condensed versions of some of the United Methodist Social Principles with us. During the summer something popped up on my computer entitled, "Ask the UMC: Why do we have Social Principles? Where did they come from?" So I thought I'd share that with you before Elaine gets back to giving us the content of the principles.

The Methodist Social Creed, predecessor to the Social Principles, originated over a century ago to express concern over the exploitation of millions of workers in factories, mines, mills, tenements, and company towns during a time of rapid industrialization and growing prosperity in the US. Developed in 1908, the Social Creed was the first document of its kind written by a church.

Five Methodist Episcopal clergymen believed the denomination required an organization to lead it into social ministry. One was Harry Ward, a Chicago pastor in the stockyard district. He conducted funerals for packinghouse workers killed in frequent factory accidents. When he penned the Social Creed, he was thinking of these families.



The list of 11 reforms the church should champion included an end to child labor and the sweatshop system, rights of workers, a living wage and safer conditions.

At the 1968 union of the Evangelical United Brethren and Methodist Churches, the social statements of both denominations were included in the first UM Discipline. These statements became the basis for a continually expanded and revised document of social commitments. Over time, it grew to include sections on family life, alcohol and other drug abuse, crime and rehabilitation, gambling, mental health, civil liberties, and peace with justice.

Six areas of concern form the major sections of the Social Principles: (1) the natural world, (2) the nurturing community, (3) the social community, (4) the economic community, (5) the political community, and (6) the world community. The Social Creed, reserved for the final section, is a resource for use in worship.

The Social Principles urge us to make a difference and to live differently in the world, but also to build a different kind of world than the one we have now. The principles have been in a process of revision with worldwide input since 2013 with the goal of making them more succinct, theologically founded, and globally relevant. The first full revision in 50 years will be presented to the 2020 General Conference.

Next week Elaine will share another section of the Social Principles with us.





# **Alternative Gifts—2019**



Many of us have too much stuff. Many others don't have what they need. So the idea of giving alternative gifts was conceived. Instead of giving a material gift to someone who really doesn't need it (and might not even want or like it), we can give an alternative gift. We can give a monetary gift in honor of the person who doesn't need more stuff!

There are many worthwhile causes needing financial help. The Intersectional Justice Committee has chosen 5 which we hope you will consider using to honor someone on your gift lists.

**Heifer International** gives animals and training to people all over the world. The recipient of an animal is expected to give the first offspring to someone else. So it is "the gift that multiplies." Gifts are available in any size—from bees or baby chicks to water buffalo.

**Church World Service** is another organization that works in many ways in many countries. One of their programs is to give blankets to people who are suffering from disasters. Only \$10 will provide a good warm blanket to someone who needs it.

**Acción Médica Cristiana (AMC)** is the organization with which Belinda Forbes, our missionary, works in Nicaragua. Nicaragua is the second poorest country in this hemisphere. AMC works to empower poor communities to improve their health and development. They begin with basics such as good water and latrines. To give to AMC, write a check to the church with "AMC – Advance #14846A" in the notation.

FUMC's Community Breakfast Program
Sunday except the first Sunday of each month.
The number of people served ranges from about 50 to more than a hundred on any given Sunday. The program is supported by grants, a small amount in our church budget, donations, and many volunteers.

**FUMC's Sustain Ministry** grew out of our former Soap and Toilet Paper ministry. Soap, diapers, toilet paper, and basic hygiene items are not covered by food stamps. These basic supplies are given to about 120 families each month, and also receives a small amount in our church budget and benefits from donations and many volunteers.

More details about the international agencies is available on their websites and will be on a display in church. You can also ask members of the intersectional Justice Committee about all of the programs.
