From our Pastor

Our Advent Theme this year is "Waiting in Hope." To some degree, this feels a little bit silly, as "Waiting in Hope" is a pretty basic description of Advent. However, it also feels like a challenge, and that makes it seem worth while.

For all of the years that I've been alive, Christianity in the United States, and United Methodism in the United States have been in decline. With each passing year, the decline has become more pre-

cipitous and fears among the faithful have risen. This year has been a spectacularly difficult one to be a United Methodist, and "hope" hasn't been the center of any conversations I've had about the denomination.

In so many ways, First UMC of Schenectady is an exception to the problems of Christianity. While Christianity fought back against evolution and climate change, the scientific method has long been valued here. While much of Christian teaching has centered on guilt, shame, and sin; compassion and gratitude have taken the front seat here. Similarly, open-mindedness, inclusion, solidarity, and joy have been front and center in this community for a very long time, and that's rare in churches. And yet, the decline that has wrecked havoc on Christianity as a whole and United Methodist Churches throughout the connection has had its way here too, and it is heartbreaking.

Hope is also challenging when we consider detention centers on our Southern Border, the escalating impacts of Climate Change, and the terrifying impacts of continued growth in income inequality. (To name but a few.) Of course, there are also challenges in our own lives: health concerns, the declining well-being of those we love, grief and loss, job security, financial hardships, anxiety and depression, loneliness, fear, and even the simple disheartened sense that not all is as it should be.

Given the weight of all of these factors, pushing us down, waiting in hope can seem almost ridiculous. Waiting in hope can even feel naive. Maybe it is, and that would be ok. But maybe it isn't. Maybe waiting in hope is a faith stance, and maybe it involves paying attention differently.

The 24 hour news cycle operates on drawing our attention, and that works best when it offers us fodder for anxiety and fear. But that means that it doesn't tell the whole story. Sometimes, when I'm most overwhelmed by the brokenness I see in the world around us, I have to remember that some things work here that don't everywhere. When I lived in Ecuador I learned that gas stations mostly don't deliver the amount of gas they say they do. But, here, we can live with some confidence that a gallon of gas is delivered when we buy one. I also learned in Ecuador that if you fail to give a nice enough Christmas gift to your postal worker, you might not get your mail for a year. Similarly, our mail works without bribes. The things that DO work don't get any attention or any gratitude until we notice them when they fail! I'm still feeling super grateful for the capacity to walk, after my fall at Easter in 2017, but it can be easy to forget what a miracle that is for those of us who can do it. It is also easy to forget what a delight it is to read, and how life-saving it is to be able to do so, until you are with a child struggling to learn it.

This season, I invite you to pay attention to what is working – while it is still working. And then, to what God is up to in making new things work. Waiting in hope is waiting to see what God can do, and that's definitely worthy of our attention.

Three Cs of "A New Day in the City: Urban Church Revival"

For the past 6 weeks, the Adult Education Team has been offering a Monday night book discussion examining *A New Day in the City: Urban Church Revival* by Donna Claycomb Sokol and L. Roger Owens. When asked to summarize the top three issues to work on in our journey toward urban church revival, the group suggested it could be stated using three verbs: Clarify, Communicate, and Connect.

As a congregation, we need to **clarify** what are our values. In order to deal with a changing neighborhood and a changing world, we need to focus on our core values and how we share our faith stories. This includes evaluating our current systems, pruning, and being open to new ideas.

If we create an environment that is permission-granting, flexible, and experimental, we will be better equipped to face unpredictable changes.

Our church's future depends on the **connections** we make with visitors, church members and all people we meet in our facility and community. When we reach out to other people and treat them with mutual support, sharing our values, we are fulfilling God's work. With meaningful connections we can better understand each other's needs. Connections bring us closer in spirit to one another and to God.

Communication helps strengthen those connections. We crave two-way, complete, and open communication; between church committees, congregation, and staff, as well as between the church and our community. We need to develop effective, caring ways to both convey information and improve how we listen and respond to one another.

The class generated many ideas of how we could be welcoming to visitors, show more gratitude to current members, include new opportunities for participation in our worship, and how we could deepen our connections to one another. We want to commit to excellence in all that we do. We encourage everyone to read this book and have a discussion with one or more people at First UMC. The church can better discern a way forward if all voices are heard. We will soon have some extra copies of the book available for borrowing. Please speak to Sue Learner if you're interested.

The Time is Now

I have gained a dearth of knowledge since walking through the doors of this church on a cold, snowy January morning in 2013. To attempt to enumerate it, or even bring forward the most important in any meaningful way, would be to do a disservice to the experiences that led to my knowledge as it must be taken in its totality.

The Christian faith we proudly espouse here follows the teaching of young Jew who served the most disenfranchised populations by telling them that any gathering in His name evokes his Presence (Matt 18:20). To this end, He made no mention of church being defined by the presence of any one person, instrument, building, or committee. The ancient Greek word commonly used in the New Testament for church is ecclesia. While the exact meaning intended by the user requires context, i.e. to differentiate between "assembly" "children of Israel" etc, no scholars have assigned to it a material nature. This further exemplifies the history of our faith as one of communities and commissions, not individuals and items.

It should be apparent by now that decisions of severe importance are coming. The timeline is indisputable, the necessity is immediate, and the consequences inevitable. We must frame the discussion, debate, and decisions not in the context of whimsical wishes or the denial of fact; but by holding true to the articles of faith we all share.

I implore those in this congregation who define this church by a singular facet to amend their definition of "church". This ecclesia we are a part of must be first and foremost bound by the pillars of the faith on which it is established. Inevitably I hear that without a specific part of the whole, the whole will cease. To speak a truth to that fiction that is not the case in the least. For well over 100 years this church has stood as a towering force for good in downtown Schenectady and the world. It attained the heights not because of the height of its Spire, the resonance of its music, or the number of its role. It owes that quality entirely to it's ecclesia.

The church is faced with a crisis of seemingly insurmountable proportion. How we chose to move forward after decades of deficit spending and the resultant budget crisis will forever shape the future of this church. The temptation to cleave to our emotional attachments is strong. The options are on the table to continue the status quo and hope for a miracle. I pray daily for the survival of this ecclesia, but not for this church. I pray that generations to come may know the same warmth I felt when I walked through these doors six winters ago. Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr. said "The time is always right to do the right thing". The time is right. The leadership of the church has agonized over the matter for years, and has made its recommendations. Trust yourself. Trust your ecclesia. Trust your God. The time is now.



The Christmas Service of Lessons & Carols



The Rose Window

The rose window was installed sometime around 1874, during the time the church building was constructed. In 1981, it was removed for cleaning and repairs, then reinstalled and covered with Lexan.

As with all rose windows, its shape is that of a wheel, with a hub and spokes, a reminder that rose windows were originally called wheel windows. A rose window is also referred to as a marigold window, for the rose is a symbol of Mary. In FUMC's rose window, the twelve spokes are a reminder of the twelve Apostles. At the end of each spoke is a quatrefoil, which resembles a four-petaled flower. A quatrefoil indicates any fourfold group of objects or attributes, such as the Four Evangelists or the Four Gospels.

Each of the four colors in the window—red, blue, green, gold—has its own symbolism. From a distance, some of the glass appears to be white, a color which stands for purity.

light and joy. Red symbolizes blood, fire, Christian zeal and the Holy Spirit; blue represents heaven, truth and constancy. The red and blue combines to form violet, a symbol of penitence, mourning and royalty. Green symbolizes life, hope, nature and growth, while gold adds the qualities of glory and splendor to the meanings of white. The different colored lights in stained glass have different properties: white is piercing, blue is luminous and expansive, red contracts at a distance and gold remains stable. As daylight fades, red will turn black but blue will remain until all the light is gone.

Many years ago, the Rev. Leon Adkins, Sr., pastor at the time, preached a sermon on the rose window. His concluding remarks still hold

today: "It (Rose Window) testifies to the central mystery of life - the union of God and man. It radiates the reality of constancy and truth. It radiates the glory of love and suffering which shall bring the Gospel of our Lord into the fulfillment of humanity's direst need and highest hope!"





Our next book discussion will be on Saturday, Jan. 11, at 10 am on "The New Jim Crow: Mass Incarceration in the Age of Colorblindness" by Michelle Alexander.

Online description:...With dazzling candor, legal scholar Michelle Alexander argues that "we have not ended racial caste in America: we have merely redesigned it." By targeting black men through the War on Drugs and decimating communities of color, the U.S. criminal justice system functions as a contemporary system of racial controlrelegating millions to a permanent secondclass status—even as it formally adheres to the principle of colorblindness. In the words of Benjamin Todd Jealous, president and CEO of the NAACP, this book is a "call to action." Called "stunning" by Pulitzer Prizewinning historian David Levering Lewis, "invaluable" by the Daily Kos, "explosive" by Kirkus, and "profoundly necessary" by the Miami Herald, this updated and revised paperback edition of The New Jim Crow, now with a foreword by Cornel West, is a must-read for all people of conscience.

PrimeTimers

PrimeTimers is a program of the General Board of Global Ministries of the United Methodist Church, offering educational and mission experiences both in the United States and abroad, with an emphasis on peace and poverty, history, the sustainability of resources, and on increasing cultural understanding. Participants do some hands-on volunteer work. The program is similar to the United Methodist Volunteers in Mission (VIM) program, but it is less strenuous. It was originally set up for older adults, but a recent change has expanded it to include younger adults.

Over the years, several of our church members have participated in PrimeTimers programs: Jim and Elaine Troy and Pete and Jan Huston went to St. Simon's Island in Georgia to learn about Methodist history, a place where both John and Charles Wesley had been at one time; Nancy and Pete Oldow and Lee and Bonnie Adkins learned about the Gullah people on an island off the coast of South Carolina; another group spent time near New Orleans, helping in a warehouse; The Hustons went to Italy where they learned what church groups there are doing to help refugees and reduce poverty; Nancy Oldow and Nancy Walden joined a group at a retreat center on the Mississippi coast to learn about life along the Gulf Coast. This retreat was a place where our very own Virgia Phoenix had spent much of her childhood. Sad to say, the center was later destroyed by Hurricane Katrina and never rebuilt. Another time, the two Nancys stayed at a retreat center in Little Rock, Arkansas, where the group toured the Clinton Library and Heifer Headquarters, and visited some of the Civil Rights movement scenes. Each program gave the participants an opportunity to help with a service project.

Three new trips are planned for 2020:

One called "Immigration Immersion," will be held in Tucson, Arizona, February 9 – 15. Participants will visit several agencies working with immigrants and will learn about detention centers and Justice for Our Neighbors. They will visit water stations and perhaps help put water in the desert for the refugees. There will be a one day tour of Nogales, Mexico (passport required) to learn about conditions, shelters and services there. There may also be a visit to the San Xavier Mission. The cost is \$900 per person and does not include travel to and from Tucson. Closing date for registration is January 10, 2020.

The second trip is to the Czech Republic, May 19-28. The focus will be on the early Bohemian Protestant Reformer, Jan Hus (1369-1415). The Bohemian Reformation had an influence on Martin Luther and later reformers, including the Wesleys. In Prague, the group will visit several sites which were significant in the Reformation. They will also tour Prague Castle, St. Vitus Cathedral, Charles Bridge, among other places. The cost is \$1,700 per person, not including air fare. Closing date for registration is January 1, 2020.

The third trip will be to the Holy Land, including Nazareth, Jerusalem, and Bethlehem, September 8 – 19. Service projects will be combined with visits to holy sites, educational information, and meetings with indigenous Christians. Participants will learn about culture and history and will experience Middle Eastern hospitality. There will be an opportunity to meet representatives from the three Abrahamic faith communities as well as from United Methodist Advance projects and partner organizations. Cost is \$3,850 per person and includes airfare from Dulles Airport. The registration closing date is June 1.

There is another opportunity, not organized by the General Board of Global Ministries but geared toward PrimeTimers, which is a **Missions Cruise to the Caribbean** in January. Stops will be in Puerto Rico, St. Thomas, the Dominican Republic and the Bahamas. The participants will visit mission sites and enjoy some tourist attractions.

Alternative Gifts—2019



The number of people served ranges from about 50 to over 100 on any given Sunday. The program is supported by grants, a small amount in our church budget, donations & many volunteers.

FUMC's Sustain Ministry grew out of our former Soap & Toilet Paper ministry. Soap, diapers, toilet paper, and basic hygiene items are not covered by food stamps. These basic supplies are given to about 120 families each month, and also receives a small amount in our church budget and benefits from donations and many volunteers.


