

From Our Pastor



One of the assumptions of Nonviolent Communication is that all of our words and actions are motivated by an attempt to get our needs met. This reality can be seen very clearly when someone is in turmoil – they often switch rapidly between various tactics, hoping desperately that one of them will work. Once you see this, you can't really un-see it. It can make me a bit squirmy to notice what I'm saying, and not saying, doing, and not doing and what it tells me about my own current state of needs.

A similar assumption is now made at our Upper New York Camp and Retreat Ministries (for whom registration is now open!!), where it goes under the title "Success Counseling." Under this model of caring for God's beloveds, what might have once been seen as "misbehaving" is now understood as a way of expressing a need that the person wasn't otherwise able to express. This doesn't mean all behavior is acceptable, but it does impact how it gets responded to.

This past week, an article by Brené Brown came past my eyes that said to "assume others are doing the best they can." Somehow, despite the information I offered you above, this was a bit of a relief to me. I particularly like this phrasing of it, because it doesn't assume that everyone is behaving well, simply that they're doing the best they can. Now, the best someone has to offer can be bad. It can be harmful, hurtful, and even abusive. This doesn't negate that reality, nor the need to hold people accountable for such actions. This is most useful in situations that are closer to neutral.

Over the course of the past year, we have been struggling together to respond to the reality of finite resources and more great ministries that we want to do than funding to support them. This created an anxious time in our midst, and the realities of the world and the denomination swirling around us made it even harder. Right now, we are relieved to say that we are going to be able to support the same level of staffing through 2020, which has been the source of the greatest dis-ease.

One of the side effects of this increased anxiety and struggle has been a decrease in the amount of "benefit of the doubt" that has been given around here. This makes perfect sense – it is natural, human, and to be expected. It is, however, pretty awful! One of the characteristics of a healthy community is one where there is trust and people give each other the benefit of the doubt. It is a lot more FUN to be in a community where your motives aren't being questioned, and your personhood is accepted and delighted in. This church has been that kind of community, and has the skills and relationships to be that kind of community. The Staff Pastor Parish Relations Committee (SPPRC) is doing active thinking about how to help all of us heal and regain trust together. I'm deeply grateful for the seriousness with which they are taking that work. Ideas are welcome if you want to contribute some – with your name attached. (One of the minor changes already being made is that feedback needs to come with people's names.)

In the meantime, I think we can all work within ourselves to listen to our inner voices, notice when they make assumptions about other people, and to reframe our thinking to "assume others are doing the best that they can." This makes a lot of space for grace in our midst, and I suspect we all want to be people of grace.

It has been said that one can be spiritual alone, but to be religious requires dealing with people with whom you disagree – and that's the POINT! We grow as people of faith when we become better at disagreeing with grace, and not letting disagreements harm relationships. May God help us find grace, and remember that everyone is doing the best they can, including ourselves.



From Church Council

January 14th at the Church Council meeting, we opened our conversation as we always do - with prayer and discernment. We meditated on the ways in which our church embodies the characteristics of God's Kingdom. We realized how caring the congregation is by providing supportive ministries such as Sustain and Community Breakfast. Many were proud to be part of such a loving and inclusive congregation; one that welcomes all of God's children with both open arms and an open-mindedness not commonly found in other churches. We marveled at the tender and compassionate work done by the Caring Ministries and at events such as the Holiday Parade Hot Cocoa.

While I heard those I hold most dear to me in my church family purport such values as belonging to First United of Schenectady. I have become painfully aware that the expression of these values did not match the dialogue surrounding them. For three years I have discerned, prayed, and worked alongside leaders in this church I deeply respect. These leaders embody what they enumerated on that night. and have done so since the day I first walked through the doors of FUMC. Recently, I have noticed significant difference. I have seen this allegedly inclusive group fracture off into factions with personal agendas. I have been personally accused of acting out of hubris, of being dishonest, and have publicly been insulted and berated numerous times. I have witnessed those claiming to serve Christ, serve only self. This is not an example of the embodiment of the caring, loving. compassionate, and inclusive group of which its members claim to be.

What I am about the share is not a sentiment that I have made public: I have chosen to take a hiatus from attending worship. This difficult decision I arrived at is due to that which I have just named, the duality I have seen between the discernment we claim and the actions we take. I was, until recently, at a very low point in my faith journey. I could not comfortably bow my head in prayer amongst a body that had filled me with such heartache.

As all my hope was seemingly lost, the very family that had driven me to this point of despair had even more rapidly raised me up. Later in the same meeting, Staff Parish came to the Church Council with a suggestion: that Sunday worship be for just that - worship, and that the "business" of the church not be conducted therein. Though the details of the SPPRC conversation that led to the suggestion are sealed, it was apparent during the explanation of the suggestion that others had felt, to varying degrees, the same angst I had surrounding Sunday Worship.

My take away from the Church Council that I wish to leave you with is twofold. Firstly I would like to say that I am never anything less than astonished by the value that can be gained from heartfelt and prayerful discernment; an act I admittedly found trite and frivolous when I first assumed the chair. It is my hope and prayer that whatever your opinion of me and my work, you take the work of Church Council to heart and meditate on the ways that you can not only name the characteristics of the Kingdom, but also on ways and measures that embody those same characteristics. Your leaders have done you a tremendous service by dedicating their hearts and minds to this level of spiritual discernment. Lastly I wish to offer everyone a chance in this new year to engage in a new and fresh outlook on Sunday worship; and leave the Sunday morning politics to the Sunday morning pundits.

Early Response Trainings

We have all heard of various natural disasters which have occurred across the country such as floods, tornados, and other severe storms. What we often don't hear about is how survivors struggle to recover during the following days, weeks and often months after the disaster. We don't think of people who have no power, no heat, no water, even though it is during winter months. We don't think of those who can't live in their home due to mold, or because the house is off its foundation. Instead we watch the news, see the destruction, and then sit down to eat dinner or go about our business the next day.

To bring this closer to home, in our own Conference, in the Utica area, there was a massive flood event on Halloween which damaged some 800 homes. People are still suffering, cleaning, repairing, replacing furnaces a full 2 months later. Most of us didn't hear about this flood, or have already forgotten about it.

But we can still help. Our Conference has a program to send people almost immediately into disaster areas to quickly, effectively, and appropriately provide a caring, Christian presence to assist survivors in recovery. It is called ERT. It stands for Early Response Team. Early Responders are trained by UMCOR during an 8 hour session with all the Who, What, Where, When, Why and How answers to the typical questions willing volunteers are apt to ask when they feel called to provide help. What do we do? We listen to survivors, we hold trembling hands, we hand out bottles of water, and listen some more. We give hugs, we assure that people care, and then we wash walls, remove wet carpet, wet wallboard, shovel mud, carry out ruined appliances, cover holes in roofs, and make homes secure again. But we don't do repairs. That happens later with rebuilding teams who are often the very same people on the Early Response Team.

So where can you receive more information and training to become an Early Responder? Attend one of two Basic Early Response training events:



February/March Book Discussion

Sponsored by our Intersectional Justice Committee, the next recommended book is entitled, "Down Girl: The Logic of Misogyny" by Kate Manne. All are welcome to pick up a copy of the book, read it and join the discussion March 14th at 10am in the Gathering Room.

Online description: Misogyny is a hot topic, yet it's often misunderstood. This book is an exploration of misogyny in public life and politics by the moral philosopher and writer Kate Manne. It argues that misogyny should not be understood primarily in terms of the hatred or hostility some men feel toward all or most women. Rather, it's



primarily about controlling, policing, punishing, and exiling the "bad" women who challenge male dominance. And it's compatible with rewarding "the good ones," and singling out other women to serve as warnings to those who are out of order.

Manne examines events that set the stage for the 2016 US presidential election. Not only was the misogyny leveled

against Hillary Clinton predictable in both quantity and quality, Manne argues it was predictable that many people would be prepared to forgive and forget regarding Donald Trump's history of sexual assault and harassment. For this, Manne argues, is misogyny's oftoverlooked and equally pernicious underbelly: exonerating or showing "himpathy" for the comparatively privileged men who dominate, threaten, and silence women.



Joint Church Meeting
