From Our Pastor



In the early years, as Christianity was developing, it became traditional to baptize new Christians on Easter. The time of prayerful reflection in preparation for making a commitment to faith grew into the tradition of Lent. As time passed, it became normal for each Christian to spend the time of preparation for Easter in intentional reflection once again, recommitting to the faith and engaging in consideration of what was next on the faith journey.

As the Church continued to develop, more and more traditions got added onto Lent, some lovely, some heavy (in the middle ages there was a lot of requiring people already on the brink of starvation to fast). To-day, within the culture at large, I think the most significant awareness of Lent comes from people being aware of the question, "What are you giving up for Lent?"

The question comes out of the idea that fasting is a spiritual practice that leads to good prayerful reflection, and that fasting comes in many forms. Fasting at its core is the idea that every time you want the thing you are fasting from, you allow that desire to be a call to prayer and a reminder to connect with the Divine. However, in practicality, the fasting I hear about often functions as a form of self-sacrifice or an attempt to force healthier habits rather.

I'm fine with healthy habits! However, I don't get the impression that most people fasting something for Lent are remembering the prayer part of fasting, and I get very worried that most of what is happening is just people beating up on themselves.

This year, I suggest an alternative spiritual practice for us all, one that is based in the idea that adding a spiritual practice for Lent is a good way to return to its roots. For anyone willing to go along, I suggest: A gratitude journal. That is, each day of Lent, write down 5 things you are grateful for. They can be anything, or you could write one for each of 5 categories:

- 1. Nature/The Created World
- 2. Beloveds (Family and/or Friends)
- 3. The Church
- 4. Community/Communities (as big as the nation, as small as you want)
- 5. An Unexpected Joy

Ideally, the answers for each day would be different, encouraging us all to prayerfully consider our days and identify what there is to be grateful for in them. (Those among us who find this too Pollyanna-ish are welcome to add ONE space for a daily difficulty or hardship. It is OK to acknowledge them, but the goal is to search for and find the good.)

There are plenty of reasons to worry, to be concerned, to raise anxiety. However, they get all the press! This year for Lent, let's find the wonders, the mysteries, the joys. I suspect we all need it, and it will prepare us well for the season of Easter.

Sunday Night Study: "Living the Questions 2.0"

The Sunday Night Study is entitled, "Living the Questions 2.0." LtQ2 is an open-minded alternative to studies that attempt to give participants all the answers and instead strives to create an environment where participants can interact with one another in exploring what's next for Christianity. Featuring thirty acclaimed scholars, theologians and other experts, LtQ2 consists of 21 sessions in 3 sections: "Invitation to Journey"; "Honoring Creation"; and "Call to Covenant." The course is truly full of great questions, and multiple potential answers. Meetings are held in the Conference Room, as the series includes a DVD with those acclaimed scholars, at 7pm Sunday nights. All are welcome. Participants are encouraged to come through the Administrative Building door, located on the porch behind the parking lot garage.

Endowment Spending, Policy Change

Given the fact that the church is no longer being supported financially in a sustainable way, the Trustees and the Investment Committee have been studying relevant law and soliciting expert opinions on changing current church policy to begin taking a percentage of principal from endowments.

At the Church Conference on March 8, 2020, the Trustees will propose that FUMC changes its policies to allow limited spending from principal in certain selected Endowment Funds. Taking of principal will be limited to no more than 2.75%, per annum. If the policy change is approved, Trustees will limit action on the change to the years 2021 and 2022. The time limit will allow the church to pursue creative ways to increase revenue and/or realign property and staffing needs with the realities of our declining attendance and income. We need to balance our budget in order to insure the future of this congregation and its ministries. 




Northeast Jurisdiction Meeting UMW

From the Church Council Chair

Church Council continues to make progress towards healing while simultaneously ensuring that the missions and ministries of the church function. Rev. Jane Baker has graciously devoted her time and talent by leading the body in meaningful discernment towards the future. I want to take this opportunity to remind everyone that the Church Council does not meet in executive session and is open for all to attend. While only members will have a vote, all are welcome and are encouraged to attend and exercise their voice. If you wish to bring a certain matter or motion forward, please reach out to me at least two weeks prior to the session so that I can ensure it is placed on the agenda for action. This is to allow members of the Council time to review the item being presented.

On February 11th, the Church Council met and took several actions that I wish to draw to your attention. The first and most important was to pass the Current Expense budget referred from Finance. The final step in the 2020 budget process will be the Church Conference on Sunday, March 8th, at 12:30. The budget is very detailed and took months to compile. The Church Council thanked the Finance Committee for its hard work. It is notable that the budget contains no cuts to employed staff time or pay.

The Investment Committee, a sub-committee of the Trustees, brought a matter through the Trustees concerning the accessing of investment principal to balance the deficit as a stop-gap measure. At the time of publication, this committee will have held a second hour presentation detailing more fully the motion that will be brought forward on March 8th at Church Conference. I will leave out the details of the motion and instead mention that Church Council affirmed this work and supports the committee in its continuation of the work.

In December 2019, the Church Council formed an ad hoc sub committee after the Charge Conference referred a motion regarding the withholding of apportionments back to Church Council. The Council placed the Financial Secretary, Finance Chair, Pastor, Lay Leaders, and a Trustee on the committee and decided it was to be chaired by the Church Council Chair. In its February 2020 meeting, the Council passed a motion from Intersectional Justice that was affirmed by the ad hoc committee to postpone future action of the ad hoc committee due to the large changes that have been made at the Annual Conference and to the potential for large changes that may result from the May 2020 General Conference. While the ad hoc committee was not dissolved, its work will be on hold temporarily.

As mentioned earlier, on Sunday, March 8th, at 12:30 we will be holding a Church Conference. By discipline a Church Conference can be called by the Church Council, its Chair, or the Pastor and must be approved by the District Superintendent. In the process of its approval, an agenda must be submitted. The purpose of a church conference is to handle matters that Church Council feels require full congregational vote and that have not been handled at the Charge Conference. This year we have not been granted the typical "open agenda" that we have been in years past. The agenda that was approved by the District Superintendent is to include the presentation of the 2020 budget, the proposed change to investment policy from the Trustees as regarding its use in the budget process, and relevant committee reports. The Chairs of all committees will continue to give reports from 2019, however they will be unable to bring forward any motions or matters for discussion to the floor. This limitation is also extended to members of the congregation in attendance. If you have a matter that you were planning on bringing forward from the floor, please reach out to me and I will work with you on the best course of action. While this cannot be the inclusion of your concern in the agenda, I will do everything in my power given the limitations specified by the District Superintendent to handle the addressing of the concern.

Your Church Council is dedicated to serving you, this church, and this community. Please do not hesitate to reach out to me if you have any questions or concerns regarding its action. Our next meeting is on March 10 at 7:30 pm and I hope to see many of you in attendance.

The Labyrinth: We have a wonderful opportunity to share the benefits of an ancient art form with those within our church and city community. We will be providing space and time for folks to explore and move through a series of circular paths that help to encourage one to center and balance energy forces within our mind, body and soul. It is a series of concentric paths that lead us into the center for a meditative journey and then allow one to travel outwards, bringing our thoughts out into the consciousness of life. There is no wrong way to travel and no one will get lost along the journey. There is only one way in to the heart of the labyrinth and one way out. The traveler is encouraged to focus in on a thought or prayer as a way on clearing one's mind for the journey. The labyrinth has been attributed to helping to decrease stress, increase focus and improve energy levels

Gather for Book DiscussionSaturday, March 14

Our February/March recommended book is entitled, "Down Girl: The Logic of Misogyny" by Kate Manne. All are welcome to pick up a copy of the book, read it and join the book discussion held on March 14 at 10:00am. Online description: Misogyny is a hot topic, yet it's often misunderstood. This book is an exploration of misogyny in public life and politics by the moral philosopher and writer Kate Manne. It argues that misogyny should not be understood primarily in terms of the hatred or hostility some men feel toward all or most women. Rather, it's primarily about controlling, policing, punishing, and exiling the "bad" women who challenge male dominance. Manne examines events that set the stage for the 2016 US presidential election. Not only was the misogyny leveled against Hillary Clinton predictable in both quantity and quality. Manne argues it was predictable that many peo-



ple would be prepared to forgive and forget regarding Donald Trump's history of sexual assault and harassment. For this, Manne argues, is misogyny's oft-overlooked and equally pernicious underbelly: exonerating or showing "himpathy" for the comparatively privileged men who dominate, threaten, and silence women.

Concert: Violin Virtuoso ELIZABETH PITCAIRN

On Sunday, March 29 at 3:00, First United Methodist Church will present a very special concert when we welcome concert violinist, Elizabeth Pitcairn along with her accompanist, Louise Thomas. Ms. Pitcairn has earned a stunning reputation as one of America's most beloved soloists.




She performs with one of the world's most legendary instruments, the "Red Mendels-

sohn" Stradivarius violin of 1720, which is claimed to have inspired the Academy Award-winning film "The Red Violin." Ms. Pitcairn is featured on the 10th Anniversary edition of "The Red Violin" DVD in a special feature called "The Auction Block." The instrument, once owned by famed violinist Joseph Joachim appeared to vanish shortly after its creation. No one knows where the violin was or to whom it belonged for a period of two hundred years. The violin resurfaced in 1930s Berlin and was purchased by an heir to the great composer Felix Mendelssohn. In 1956 it was purchased by a New York industrialist who kept the instrument in impeccable condition. On Thanksgiving Day of 1990 the instrument went up for auction at Christie's in London and was won by her grandfather and given to Elizabeth as a gift. Her performance here at First UMC will include works by Saint-Saëns. Mozart. Beethoven and Clara Schumann as well as many virtuoso show pieces.

In conjunction with our concert, Proctors Theater will be hosting two showings of "The Red Violin" on Thursday, March 26, at 12 noon and at 7 pm. Elizabeth Pitcairn will be present only at the 7 pm showing for a brief Question and Answer period, and a demonstration of the instrument. Tickets can be purchased from Proctors Theater for \$9 adults, \$6 seniors/students for the 12:00 showing of the movie or \$9 for all tickets at 7:00 pm. Seating will be limited to 80 people per show so advance ticket sales are suggested. C. Human Sexuality

We affirm human sexuality as a sacred gift and acknowledge that sexual intimacy contributes to fostering the emotional, spiritual, and physical well-being of individuals and to nurturing healthy sexual relationships that are grounded in love, care and respect.

Human sexuality is a healthy and natural part of life that is expressed in wonderfully diverse ways from birth to death. It is shaped by a combination of nature and nurture: heredity and genetic factors on the one hand, and childhood development and environment on the other. We further honor the diversity of choices and vocations in relation to sexuality such as celibacy, marriage and singleness.

We support the rights of all people to exercise personal consent in sexual relationships, to make decisions about their own bodies and be supported in those decisions, to receive comprehensive sexual education, to be free from sexual exploitation and violence, and to have access to adequate sexual health care.

D. Marriage

Within the church, we affirm marriage as a sacred, lifelong covenant that brings two people of faith into union with one another and into deeper relationship with God and the religious community.

While The United Methodist Church does not recognize marriage as a sacrament, we celebrate and cherish this union as an expression of the couple's faith, grounded in their relationship with God and one another. Marriage thus reflects a continued willingness to grow together in Christ and a commitment to cultivate a covenantal bond that encompasses intimacy, grace and love.

As members of the larger society, we also affirm the importance of civil marriage, the legal recognition of domestic unions by the state. Such legal recognition is vital for guaranteeing family stability and the orderly regulation of inheritances, and for providing assurance that spouses and children are afforded all the rights, benefits, and protections to which they are entitled.

Basic Rights and Freedoms

I. Sexual Orientations and Gender Identities

Because all people are of sacred worth and certain basic human rights are due to everyone, we are committed to supporting the equal rights, liberties and protections of all people, regardless of sexual orientation or gender identity. We see clear issues of equality and justice in protecting the rightful claims of those with shared



material resources, pensions, guardian relationships, mutual powers of attorney, and other lawful claims typically attendant to contractual relationships that involve shared contributions, responsibilities and liabilities, and equal protection before the law. Moreover, because in many countries sexual and gender minorities are disproportionately impacted by social stigmas, discrimination, coercion and violence, we call on churches, governments, businesses, and civic organizations to do all in their power to combat such unjust treatment and to promote equal rights and protections for all.

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► News from Nicaragua

Several members of this church donated to Acción Médica Cristiana as an alternative Christmas gift. Acción Médica Cristiana (AMC) is Christian Medical Action in Nicaragua – the agency with which our missionary friend, Belinda Forbes, is affiliated. Belinda has sent a thank you to the church as well as information about how the money will be used.



It will be used to update a health post in a village named La Pita Coyolar in the mountainous Matagalpa area. It is a rural community 9.3 miles northeast of the nearest town. There are 223 families for a total population of 1047 residents, almost a third under 15 years of age. The community covers a 3 mile radius and most families live from subsistence farming. The closest health post is 5 miles from the community where a doctor and nurse provide services 5 days a week. There is no other public or private health care available. There is no public transportation system; most people travel by foot or horseback, or on a minibus that enters the community once a day.

A building in La Pita was used up until 3 years ago by community health leaders who were trained by the Nicaraguan Ministry of Health. Community health leaders are often the first and only response to a primary health issue and are the general promoters and liaisons for health. The building fell into such disrepair that it can no longer be used in its current condition. The roof leaks, the dirt floor is cracked, and windows and doors do not provide security to the structure. There is no waiting area for patients and the wooden slats that serve as walls are deteriorating. Belinda sent photos that Eileen Deming has posted for us. Most community members must travel on foot and endure heavy rain or harsh sun. And the most vulnerable, women and children, are often subject to assault and harassment on the way.

The community met to agree that closer access to health care is a priority. They appealed to both AMC and the Dept. of Health for funding to renovate the building and create a space for clinical health care services as well as health education and promotion. The total cost of the project is \$7716. The donations from our alternative gift giving will be applied to this project.

AMC is currently carrying out a project in maternal and child health in La Pita. The reactivation of the health post will guarantee more successful and sustainable results of this project by providing a space where community health promoters can meet and work to offer health education information and carry out health awareness campaigns to the population. I've put detailed information about the building plans, costs, and anticipated results on the bulletin board outside the library.


