The Intersectional Justice Committee (IJC) continues to invite members of the congregation to participate in book discussions in order to discuss and broaden our knowledge base on a range of justice matters. The April



book is The Third Reconstruction: How a Moral Movement is Overcoming the Politics of Division and Fear by Rev. Dr. William J. Barber II, and our next discussion will be Saturday, April 29th, at 10:00 AM. Rev. Dr. Barber is the founder of the Moral Mondays Movement in NC and is one of Pastor Sara's personal heroes and most compelling preachers she has ever heard. In this book, he tells "the stirring story of how he helped start a movement to bridge America's racial divide." Over the summer of 2013. Rev. Dr. Barber led more than a hundred thousand people at rallies across NC to protest restrictions to voting access and an extreme makeover of state government. This is a movement that has spread around the country, including being emulated here in NY State. This book tells the story of this movement (plus, it's relatively short!). Please join us in this important discussion that can help to inform our own resistance efforts today.

From Our Pastor

There is an often told story of "fiery sermon" preached by a camp counselor to a young person who had been isolating themselves from the group. The counselor took and moved a brightly burning log from the center of the fire off to the side. Quickly the log's fire was extinguished. The counselor then returned the log to the rest of the burn-

ing logs, and it was again quickly reignited. This story is told to indicate that faith works best in community, or at least that's how I've always heard it.

I love a good campfire, but I've spent much more time contemplating the impact of one thing on another while I've sat on ski lifts watching how snow accumulates and melts. One of my favorite phenomenon occurs when a person has walked up the mountain under the ski lift in the middle of winter. The condensing that happens under that person's feet, the tighter connection of snow-flake to snow flake becomes visible as the snow around it melts, leaving elevated, inverted foot prints that continue to exist after the snow around it has melted. While that could also preach to the importance of community, I've often thought it also speaks to the unexpected power of adversity. The untouched snow melts at a normal rate. The stepped on snow has more resilience because of being pressed together and more tightly bonded. That doesn't make the adversity good, but it does mean that the adversity CAN strengthen those impacted by it.

A mentor once suggested that there are two kinds of clergy: those who understand grace from their own lives and those who don't. As much as I hate binary thinking, and as limited of a model as that is, there are ways that it rings true. Struggle and adversity often have the unexpected impact of opening a person to God's grace, softening the parts that are hard, and helping a person let go of control. (I am told there are lots of people in the world who don't struggle with control, but that's so profoundly different from my natural way of being that I don't quite understand.) In letting go, and in being lifted up by grace, it is possible to trust God more deeply and then to love God more deeply and then it is easier to love neighbors with deeper grace. Struggle and adversity aren't inherently good, but God is so creative that they can have a positive impact in the long run anyway.

As we all know, however, struggle and adversity can also have the opposite impact. They can harden us and close us off. I have no intention of romanticizing struggle.

Instead, I simply seek to offer observation. It seems more common for grace to find its way in when a person chooses to be vulnerable with trusted people in their lives. It seems more common for grace to find its way in when a person is honest, and transparent, and admits that nothing is going right. It seems that commonly other people are able to be means of grace when they can listen to someone's struggles without judgement or competition. That is, it seems like adversity can be transformed to grace when it is shared. I'm pretty sure that one snow flake smashed into a mountain by a footstep melts FASTER than an unsmashed snowflake. It is only when the pressure is shared that it's resiliency is built.

All of this is a very longwinded way of encouraging you to be open, honest, vulnerable, and present. Our studies, worship, and even our committees are spaces for people to connect to one another and share our struggles. The Body of Christ is functional because of its diversity, and we are able to be gifts to each other. I hope we will each give each other the opportunity to be of support in our lives.

Update on Intersectional Justice Work

We have several updates and opportunities to share with you this month. First, due to the recent passing of Bishop Felton May and the timing of his memorial service, **our conversation with Bishop Webb has had to be postponed until Sunday, October 8th at 2:00 pm**. After considering a variety of options for rescheduling this conversation, we have decided to work with the bishop's office to reschedule for October.

At the February 26th Annual Church Meeting, the IJ committee was asked to examine ways that FUMC can support immigrants and refugees during the current state of persecution of such individuals, particularly those without adequate residency/citizenship documentation. We are in the process of carefully studying this matter. Our first steps are educational in nature and include reaching out to a variety of knowledgeable individuals and organizations serving refugees and immigrants so that we can learn about and evaluate the best ways of plugging into the various efforts to provide support.

While that is taking place, we have joined a movement led by Citizen Action NY that is pushing for the Schenectady City Council to hold a formal conversation about whether or not Schenectady should adopt a sanctuary city designation (meaning that it wouldn't use city resources, including the police department, to do Immigration and Customs Enforcement officers' work for them and question the citizenship status of Schenectady residents, workers or visitors, and wouldn't send such information to federal authorities if they come across it).

The City Council meets every 2nd and 4th Monday at 7 PM, and we are seeking to have 1-2 FUMC members there every meeting to join with other community members in publicly speaking, naming their membership at FUMC, and calling on the City Council to hold this conversation and move toward designating Schenectady a sanctuary city. Speaking is as simple as signing up before the meeting starts and, when called upon, calling on the City Council to do this and stating why you think it should, including naming our Christian/personal values that inform why we believe this is the right thing to do (like "love of neighbor" or "human dignity") or sharing a personal story or something like that in the gospel of Matthew where Jesus' parents sought refuge in Egypt for a few years during his infancy and toddler years in order to escape King Herod's slaughter of the male babies. See Kevin Nelson about participating in this effort.



► Schenectady Clergy Against Hate

Delivered on February 19, 2017, by Paul Uppal, guest speaker

- Thank you to Rev. Sara Baron, Kevin Nelson, and the entire congregation of the First United Methodist Church of Schenectady for the invitation to talk about the "Schenectady Clergy Against Hate" coalition and the Sikh religion's perspective on the current political climate.
- Background of the start of the coalition toxic political and social climate across our land.
 People not respecting each other. Intolerance toward minority groups.
- America has had periodic times of such intolerance and rancor Civil War, early 20th century during immigration wave from Europe, immediately after the 9/11 attacks.
- America's strength lies in its resiliency, reflection and ability to bounce back once citizens think over what is happening.
- Need re-kindling of that American spirit, never more than now.
- The coalition seeks to spread love, understanding and brotherhood across the Schenectady and surrounding areas.
- The coalition has the ultimate weapon to fight against the current climate the Lord's love and teachings.
- Approximately 15 houses of worship represented in the coalition. Religions represented are Christianity, Islam, Hinduism, Islam.
- Rev. Baron is a very important and key member of the coalition. Very dedicated and energetic.
- Events organized to date include: Visit and work at the Regional Food Bank, A Soup Sabbath Dinner at the Congregation Gates Of Heaven and interfaith discussion and perspectives on the current climate, Blood donation drive, candlelight community walk. Other events planned.
- The Sikh community is a proud member of the coalition.
- Sikhism founded in the late 15th century by Guru Nanak in Northwestern India.
- A synthesis of Hinduism and Islam, forged into a new religious philosophy.
- Sikhism is the 5th largest religion, with about 30 million Sikhs worldwide. Locally, about 300 families. Temple in Niskayuna at intersection of Route 7 and St. Davids Lane.
- Sikhs believe in one God, absolute equality of gender and social class, social activism for justice and equality.
- In current climate, all faiths offer valuable insights on how to cope and revive our spirits.
- In Christianity, the Book of Psalms is generally considered a valuable place to go when one is hurting.
- Psalms 34:18 The Lord is near to the brokenhearted and Saves the crushed in spirit.
- The Book of Romans also offers great insights. Such as how a person can stay on right path.
- Romans 12:12 Rejoicing in hope; patient in tribulation; continuing instant in prayer.
- In Sikhism, there are also key passages and compositions in our Holy Scripture on these areas.
- The central philosophy of Sikhism is contained in our omnibus prayer:

There is One Universal Creator God His name is the Truth He is a Creative Being Personified He has no Fear He has no Hatred He is Undying He is beyond Birth He is Self Existent

- Saint Kabir, who lived in the same period as the founder of Sikhism, Guru Nanak, composed a passage that is
 in our Holy Scripture.
- Saint Kabir, born a Hindu, abandoned at birth on the banks of the River Ganges in Varanasi and raised by a
 Muslim family. Grew to reject both faiths in favor of a "blended" thought and set of values.

► Planned Parenthood Mohawk Hudson

Delivered on March 5, 2017, by Rev. Sara Baron

In this moment I'm wearing my "Board Member for Planned Parenthood Mohawk Hudson" hat. Mohawk Hudson has 10 health centers: Amsterdam, Clifton Park, Cobleskill, Glens Falls, Johnstown, Oneida, Rome, Saratoga, Schenectady, and Utica. It is a large area, although New York State has 9 Affiliates. All the affiliates work together in advocacy and education through a new shared group: Planned Parenthood Empire State Acts.

The mission of Planned Parenthood Mohawk Hudson is "to provide quality health care, to educate individuals to make informed sexual and reproductive decisions, and to advocate for reproductive rights." In particular, we provide "quality, nonjudgmental reproductive medical care and supports those affected by sexual violence; promotes healthy sexuality through education; and advocates for reproductive justice."



That happens on a large scale with our 10 health centers. Each year more than 20,000 women and men receive health care in those centers. For many (most?) of our patients, we are the only health care provider they see in a year. Our medical services include annual exams, birth control, cancer screening, abortion care, HIV testing, and sexually transmitted infections testing/treatment. Recently we have expanded into offering transgender care, starting a few years ago in our Saratoga Springs center and now we are expanding into other centers.

Here in Schenectady, PP does some of its most awesome educational work, because of the support of the Schenectady School System. Schenectady had unusually high rates of teen pregnancy, until the School District allowed our educators to have office space in the high school, and we staffed it full time. Now students have easy access to accurate information, answers to questions, and ways to get referrals for any care they need. The teen pregnancy rate is dropping!

At our local fundraiser two years ago some of the staff mentioned how annoying the protestors are, especially during their 40 day protests in fall and spring. Apparently they sing loudly and off-key, and there are often clergy men in black robes chanting in Latin. I laughingly suggested that I could have clergy WOMEN in WHITE ROBES show up and do a rally to counter balance it, and we did! Better yet the clergy all showed up with rainbow stoles. The second time we did it we let our clergy brothers play too, and it was awesome! The third time we did it non-clergy wanted to play too and it was even better.

Once spring comes (back?) we're likely to do more rallies. Our staff need to know they're appreciated, and people need to know that access to medical care is an imperative part of reproductive justice and that we TRUST WOMEN to make the best choices for their lives and the lives of their family. I'll let you know when those get planned.

Mostly though, thank you for all the ways you share me with PPMH. I believe FUMC Schenectady and PPMH enhance each other, and I'm so glad to get to be a part of that reproductive justice work.

► The Nurturing Father's Program of Schenectady

Delivered on March 12, 2017, by Wales Brown, guest speaker

Hello, myself (Wales Brown) and Muhammad Harris are leaders in the Nurturing Fathers Program of Schenectady. The Nurturing Fathers Program is a strength based psychoeducational group program that helps dad's learn how to strengthen attachment and con-



nection with their children and whole family. We are very grateful to the church for allowing us to meet and hold the group which occurs on Thursday nights from 6-8. The Nurturing Fathers Program began as a way to connect and help Walter Simpkins from the Community Fathers Program, to strengthen his ability to demonstrate positive outcomes that Parent Education with Fathers provides so he can apply for grants. What has been learned in the start of this work is that there are many fathers that are required (by Courts) to get "parenting education" however there are no classes available to fathers to get this help if they are not being served by the local Department of Social Services. The only other alternative is the Community Fathers Program that primarily works with fathers that are involved in domestic violence. This results in a "block" for fathers to proceed with reconnecting with children. The class is also highly evidence based with dads re-entering the community from incarceration. This class is being offered for free and there is no cost to the fathers. This is a volunteer effort in the community meeting a social justice need.

▶ The Caring Ministry Program

Good morning.

For those of you who do not know me, my name is Lisa Lane and I have been a member of First United Methodist Church since 2001. After a rather extensive search for the "right" church, Jean and I decided that First was the perfect fit for us. What impressed me greatly was the number of mission opportunities available for folks to serve on... the Soap Ministry, UMCOR, the support of Belinda Forbes in her mission work in Nicaragua, shared ideas of supporting the Church World Service blanket program, Heifer and the list continued to grow as I spent more time here. I have become so impressed with the efforts of congregants in working on such projects as Reconciling Ministries which works alongside Church, Society and Mission and the combined committee is called The Intersectional Justice Committee, Home Furnishings, Elsie's Closet and three projects very near and dear to me, the Stephen Ministry, the Community Breakfast Program and the Sustain Ministry (formerly called the Soap Ministry). I have not even mentioned all the mission projects that First is involved in. I continually see members of First United Methodist working so hard to help out folks locally, statewide, nationally and internationally.

As I spent more time with folks in the congregation, I became increasingly aware that, yes, we are a church who loves to learn and yearns to be a gift to our communities. We continue to do a great job at those tasks. There was an important part missing, however... and that was taking care of some of our own congregation. It is true that Pastor Sara and Linda receive important information each week regarding happenings, good and challenging, with our congregants. At other times, messages are conveyed from one member of our congregation to another, and not everyone who might be concerned receives that information. Under such circumstances, the congregants in need may not receive the love and prayers and assistance that their church family would like to offer to them. (It is also recognized that not everyone wants information shared and of course, that wish will be honored.)



A way to address some of these needs had been addressed by Lois Atkinson and Kendra Boyden. After a bit of time, Jan Guzior and I were asked to co-lead the Caring Ministry team...right up my alley. We put our heads together and we offer note writing, card sending, and the coordination of meal deliveries for those in need during times of a personal crisis, as well as arranging for transport to and from the Sunday Worship Service under special circumstances. At times, we celebrate the "good things" such as a baptism, special birthday or anniversary...and our messages convey a feeling of caring to the recipients, which of course, also includes the home-bound members. We have had some positive feedback from folks we have reached out to. Jan and I are always open to listening to suggestions of how we can provide loving and caring support to those here at First.

I'd like to end with a quote from Little Things:

Look around you, first in your own family, then among your friends and neighbors, and see whether there be not someone whose little burden you can lighten, whose little cares you may lessen, whose little pleasures you can promote, whose little wants and wishes you can gratify.

The Westminster Concert Bell Choir

Sunday, May 14...mark your calendar!

One of the finest handbell choirs in the country, the Westminster Concert Bell Choir will perform in the sanctuary at FUMC on Sunday afternoon, May 14th, at 3:00 pm. Whether you have or haven't had the pleasure of hearing FUMC's bell choir on Sunday mornings you will be absolutely thrilled with this virtuoso ensemble. It performs on the largest range of handbells in the world – 8 octaves (our bell choir has five octaves). Most of the bells are made of bronze and range in weight from four ounces to 11 pounds. The Choir also uses the large "Basso Profundo" aluminum-cast bells, and supplements its handbells with a six-octave range of chimes, the widest range in existence.

The Choir is composed of students at Rider University's Westminster Choir College in Princeton, New Jersey. Kathleen Ebling Shaw, director, has conducted the Choir for 26 years. She is a member of the sacred music department at the College, where she teaches classes in handbell training and conducts a second handbell choir. She is well known as a handbell clinician and has conducted sessions for handbell musicians and educators in this country and abroad.

The Choir has appeared several times on Public Television and has been heard annually on National Public Radio. It has performed at Carnegie Hall, and recently was featured on New Jersey Network's *State of the Arts* program. It has made 11 solo recordings and is included on an NPR Christmas recording. The ensemble joined Julie Andrews, Christopher Plummer, Charlotte Church and the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra for a 15-city North American tour entitled "A Royal Christmas."

We are very fortunate to have this group perform as a part of our Concert Series and hope that you will take advantage of this opportunity to come to the concert. As always, it's free and the public is invited.




