





## ► Africa University

Delivered on June 11, 2017, by Shirley Byers, guest speaker

Celebrating 25 years of Africa University --- a United Methodist Institution

African Methodist Bishops came to the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry with a gleam in their eyes and a dream in their heart. African local church laity and clergy dreamed of a United Methodist University in Africa.

The 1988 General Conference was within 9 votes of being unanimous in exuberantly supporting the whole project. In 1992 the first classes were held in old farm buildings on property the church owned in Old Mutare, Zimbabwe. 42 students were matriculated in the Faculties of Theology and Agriculture and Natural Resources.

Fast forward to 2017 to celebrate 25 years and more than 7000 graduates making a difference in 32 African countries---graduates from the Faculties of Education, Management and Administration, Humanities and Social Sciences, and Health Services. Most faculties now offer graduate degrees. The Institute of Peace, Leadership and Governance may soon award the University's first doctoral degrees. Today we celebrate Peace with Justice Sunday. Graduates of the Institute of Peace, Leadership, and Governance are working to create peace and teach processes of creating peaceful communities in African countries.



Graduates -- "Changing Africa: Learning there. Living there. Leading there. Serving God. All the time. Everywhere."

In 1989 after General Conference voted to establish Africa University - a United Methodist Institution, Pastor Carl Byers walked to Troy Conference from Nassau, Bob Long rode his bike and other participating pastors and laity raised more than \$10,000 for AU.

In 2011, Upper New York Annual Conference voted with only 1 "no" vote to raise \$1,000,000 for scholarships to be awarded at AU in perpetuity. \$603,000 has been raised.

In the year that Virgia Phoenix was awarded the Denman Award for laity, friends of First UMC Schenectady, and family and friends of Virgia initiated a scholarship in honor of Virgia. Bob Long continues to ride to conference and rides to support the Virga Phoenix Scholarship.

We're celebrating AU's 25<sup>th</sup> birthday with parties across conference with African music, games, food and gifts.

### **▶ The Labor-Religion Coalition**

Delivered on July 9, 2017, by the Rev. Emily McNeill, guest speaker

Good morning. I'm Rev. Emily McNeill and I'm the director of the Labor-Religion Coalition of New York State. I'm very happy to be able to worship with you all this morning and to share with you a bit about the work that we do at the Labor-Religion Coalition.

The Labor-Religion Coalition is based not far from here, in Latham, but we work statewide. Our mission is to unite faith, labor and community in a statewide movement for social, racial and economic justice, grounded in our deeply held moral and democratic values. We envision a New York in which every person has enough to eat and a safe place to live, where everyone can access healthcare, education, and a good job, and where no one is discriminated against on the basis of race, gender, sexual orientation, immigration status, ability, or national origin. We believe that this kind of just society is possible in New York, and that our values compel us to work to make it a reality. For myself and for many of the people in our network across the state, those values come from our Christian faith and from the life and ministry of Jesus. For others, those values are rooted in Judaism, Islam, Hinduism, Buddhism or humanism. And still others don't identify with any particular religious tradition but also hold deep convictions about the dignity of all people and our moral duty to build a more just society.

So what does the work of uniting faith, labor and community in a movement for justice look like? Part of what we do is partner with other organizations on campaigns for specific policy changes at the state level. For example, we're part of the Campaign for NY Health, which is working to pass legislation that would create a universal healthcare system that would cover every resident of New York State. We also are part of a coalition called Challenging Incarceration, which was part of passing Raise the Age legislation this year, so that 16 & 17 year olds are no longer automatically charged as adults. Other campaigns we're part of focus on immigrant rights, worker justice, and funding for public schools and social services.

We also know, though, that we have to do more than take on single-issue campaigns. To create the kind of New York I spoke about earlier, we need a movement that brings people together across the different issues that we care about, across different regions, and across lines of race and class and religion. To be successful, we need to cultivate deep connections of solidarity and compassion. To help facilitate some of these connections, this summer and fall we are organizing a Truth Commission on Poverty in NYS. These Truth Commissions are places where people come together to talk about how poverty, racism and other injustices are impacting them and their communities -- and to talk about what is already being done or could be done to respond.

The first event happened in Cuba, NY - a small town in rural Allegany County - on June 1. The second is going to be right here in this church on Thursday at 5pm, and the third will be on Long Island on Sept. 12. We are also collecting written or recorded testimony from folks who can't come to one of the events. The goal is to build a better understanding of what people are facing in our communities and why, and to identify and connect directly impacted leaders across the state. Our hunch is that we are going to find commonalities across these very different parts of New York State in terms of what we are facing now and the change we want to see. In October, we are hosting a statewide gathering in Binghamton to reflect on what we hear through this process and to plan for how we can take action together to respond. Rev. William Barber, who you may know from the Moral Mondays Movement in North Carolina, will be the keynote speaker and will talk about how this statewide effort in New York can connect with the national effort to build a new Poor People's Campaign.

I know that is a lot of information, but I will be sticking around after worship and am happy to talk with any of you who have questions or would like more information.

I hope you'll consider joining us for the Capital Region Truth Commission this Thursday right here at 5 pm. You can also visit laborreligion.org - all one word - to learn more about any of the work I mentioned and to sign up to be a part of this important work!





## **September Book Discussion**

On July 23<sup>rd</sup>, the scripture readings were from John 6:1-21—the stories about Jesus feeding the five thousand and Jesus walking on water across the Sea of Galilee. Have you ever read such stories and wondered, "Did these stories really happen?" If so, our September book discussion is for you! For our next book study, and in honor of John Dominic Crossan's visit in September, the Intersectional Justice Committee is inviting the congregation to read, *The Acts of Jesus: What Did Jesus Really Do?* which we will discuss on Saturday, September 16<sup>th</sup>, at 10 AM. Crossan's visit will be the following weekend.

Crossan is a New Testament scholar, historian of early Christianity, former Catholic priest, and a member of the Jesus Seminar. The Jesus Seminar was a group of 150 critical biblical scholars

and laymen who have been foremost in the field of historical Jesus research. Their special contributions have been related to uncovering the authentic words and deeds of Jesus. Marcus Borg, a previous lecturer at FUMC, was also a member.



Their seminal and most popular work was *The Five Gospels: What Did Jesus Really Say?* And the companion to that is *The Acts of Jesus: What Did Jesus Really Do?* By Robert W. Funk and The Jesus Seminar. Funk was the convener of the Jesus Seminar until his death in 2005.

The Acts of Jesus, despite being a long book, is organized in a particularly accessible way that makes it easy to read and participate in the discussion. The parts that are critical to read are the introduction and the concluding chapter, "What Do We Really Know About Jesus?" In between are translations of half a dozen gospels and specific chapters on the birth/infancy stories and the empty tomb/appearances/ascension. You are encouraged to read as much of the in between material as you find interesting and engaging. Kevin M. Nelson (kmichael07@yahoo. com) can provide you with a gently used copy of The Acts of Jesus for \$16 or you can get your own through a library or other source. 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### Susan Wolfe Hassinger

Susan Wolfe Hassinger was elected a bishop of the United Methodist Church in 1996. She was the Bishop of the Albany area from 2006-2010.

Bishop Hassinger has worked with congregations and church organizations of various sizes, settings, and racial/ethnic backgrounds in conflict transformation, visioning, team building, and congregational development.

Her training, in addition to extensive work in conflict transformation, has included organizational development, family systems as applied to groups and organizations, anti-racism and white privilege, and leadership for change. Bishop Hassinger has also facilitated groups, including the annual conference, in processes of decision-making in addition to or instead of parliamentary procedure. Her practice of spiritual discernment with individuals and groups draws on the "holy conferencing" of John Wesley, as well as such diverse perspectives as the Quaker clearness committee and the Ignatian spiritual exercises.

Bishop Hassinger has been part of the design team and was the first president of JustPeace Center for Conflict Transformation and Mediation. She has also served on a task force on Theological Education and Leadership Formation that included representatives of the Council of Bishops of the United Methodist Church, the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry, and the Association of United Methodist Theological Schools. That task force has produced a working document "A Wesleyan Vision for Theological Education and Leadership Formation for the 21st Century." Bishop Hassinger continues as bishop-in-residence and lecturer at Boston University School of Theology.





# John Dominic Crossan presenting Carl Lectures in September!

John Dominic Crossan is coming to First UMC. He will provide two lectures on Saturday, September 23, at 10:00 am and 1:30 pm, with lunch in between. He will preach on Sunday morning, September 24, with a time for engagement in second hour following worship. We are blessed to have one of the world's most significant biblical scholars as our quest lecturer. As usual, we will not keep Dr. Crossan only

to ourselves but invite the widest community. You are encouraged to save these dates now and invite others whom you know might be interested.

John Dominic Crossan was born in Nenagh, Co. Tipperary, Ireland, in 1934. He was educated in Ireland and the United States, received a Doctorate of Divinity from Maynooth College, Ireland, in 1959, and did post-doctoral research at the Pontifical Biblical Institute in Rome from 1959 to 1961 and at the École Biblique in Jerusalem from 1965 to 1967. He was a member of a thirteenth-century Roman Catholic religious order, the Servites (*Ordo Servorum Mariae*), from 1950 to 1969 and an ordained priest from 1957 to 1969. He joined DePaul University, Chicago, in 1969 and remained there until 1995. He is now a Professor Emeritus in its Department of Religious Studies.

He was Co-Chair of the Jesus Seminar from 1985 to 1996 as it met in twice-annual meetings to debate the historicity of the life of Jesus in the gospels. He was Chair of the Parables Seminar in 1972 -76, Editor of *Semeia. An Experimental Journal for Biblical Criticism* in 1980-86, and Chair of the Historical Jesus Section in 1993-1998, within the Society of Biblical Literature, an international scholarly association for biblical study based in the United States. He was elected Vice President of that Society for 2010-2011 and President for 2011-2012.

He has received awards for scholarly excellence from the American Academy of Religion in 1989, DePaul University in 1991 and 1995, and an honorary doctorate from Stetson University, DeLand, FL, in 2003.

He has lectured to lay and scholarly audiences across the United States as well as in Ireland and England, Scandinavia and Finland, Australia and New Zealand, Brazil, Japan, and South Africa. He has been interviewed on 200 radio stations, including four times on NPR's "Fresh Air" with Terry Gross. He has been interviewed on television networks in England and the United States by major news agencies as well as on cable programs such as A&E, History, Discovery, and the National Geographic Channel.

He has written twenty-eight books on the historical Jesus, the apostle Paul, and earliest Christianity, and his work has been translated into thirteen foreign languages, including Polish, Hungarian, Russian, as well as Korean, Chinese, and Japanese. Five of those books have been national religious bestsellers for a combined total of twenty-four months. The scholarly core of his work is the trilogy from *The Historical Jesus: The Life of a Mediterranean Jewish Peasant* (1991) through *The Birth of Christianity: Discovering What Happened in the Years Immediately After the Execution of Jesus* (1998), to *In Search of Paul: How Jesus's Apostle Opposed Rome's Empire with God's Kingdom*, co-authored with the archaeologist Jonathan L. Reed (2004).

Along with Marcus Borg, he has co-authored a series of books: The Last Week: A Day by Day Account of Jesus's Final Week in Jerusalem (2006); The First Christmas: What the Gospels Really Teach about the Birth of Jesus (2007); and The First Paul: Reclaiming the Radical Visionary Behind the Church's Conservative Icon (2009).

His most recent publication is *How to Read the Bible and Still Be a Christian: Struggling with Divine Violence from Genesis through Revelation* (March, 2015).
