From our Pastor



On December 3rd we will enter the season of Advent, a season of yearning and waiting for God to act in the world. It is the beginning of the liturgical year, each and every time we start with yearning and waiting. This Advent we will be offering our very own Devotional, with reflections from within our church themed on "Enough." The Devotionals will be available at worship on December 3rd, and personally I can't wait to read them.

We've been talking about "Enough" a lot recently, and sometimes even about "Abundance." In Church Council in November, we discussed the question "What if we (this church) are already enough?" I get to ask those questions, but I don't usually think about them before we are in conversation. As we discussed, there was a whole lot of honesty and wisdom. There was also, as expected, some resistance to the idea that we are already enough. That's practical and real! We have fewer people than we did in our heyday, and that is real. The generous gifts of our current congregation (and they truly are generous) no longer pay the costs of our ministry. That's real, and it doesn't feel like enough. We are doing such wonderful ministry, and there are reasonable concerns about how sustainable this will be over the long run. That creates some worry, and that worry is justified, and it stands in opposition to my theme of "enough."

Like others, clergy often learn what we think when we say it. In the midst of the ways the Spirit was present in the room, I heard myself say something along the lines of, "I believe the purpose of life as Christians (individually and together) is to build the kin-dom of God. That means the purpose of the church is to enable us to build the kin-dom of God. The kin-dom is the point. Everything else supports it – the building, the community, the financial and other resources we have – those are all for the building of the kin-dom. But they aren't the only resources we have! God has gifted us with MANY ways to build the kin-dom, and we are to use all that we have as good stewards. The building, the community, and our shared resources are fantastically useful in building the kin-dom, but they're only tools, not the point! The kin-dom is the point, and God has gifted us with enough to build the kin-dom." After it came out of my mouth, I realized this is part of what I've been trying to get my mind around for months. (Thanks Church Council, for listening me into understanding.)

God is with us, God works with us, God works in us, and as Julian of Norwich said, "All shall be well, and all shall be well and all manner of thing shall be well." There are many things in the world and in our communities that are profoundly broken, but God is not at peace with that, and God will keep working with us (or despite us) to fix them!

This Advent season of waiting culminates with Christmas, when we celebrate God breaking into the world in new and wonderful ways. It serves to remind us of "Emmanuel" that "God is with us" and we are not doing any thing we're doing alone!! Thanks be to God. God's own self is the most important resource we have in building the kin-dom.

Furthermore, we have a lot more resources, and they're wonderful! We are part of an incredible community, with a stunningly beautiful building, and faithful financial gifts from those who have gone on before us. Also we have love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness,

gentleness, and self-control. (Gifts of the Spirit). Finally, we have a vision of a better world and a calling to help bring that world into being.

At the end of this season of waiting, we celebrate God's in-breaking in the world, and that it happens time and time again. There really are an abundance of gifts from God for the building of the kin-dom to

celebrate! Thanks be.








Enjoy Needlework?

The Christmas Service of Lessons & Carols

The Rose Window

The rose window was installed sometime around 1874, during the time the church building was constructed. In 1981, it was removed for cleaning and repairs, then rein-

stalled and covered with Lexan.

As with all rose windows, its shape is that of a wheel, with a hub and spokes, a reminder that rose windows were originally called wheel windows. A rose window is also referred to as a marigold window, for the rose is a symbol of Mary. In FUMC's rose window, the

twelve spokes are a reminder of the twelve Apostles. At the end of each spoke is a quatrefoil, which resembles a four-petaled flower. A quatrefoil indicates any fourfold group of objects or attributes, such as the Four Evangelists or the Four Gospels.

Each of the four colors in the window-red, blue, green, gold—has its own symbolism. From a distance, some of the glass appears to be white, a color which stands for purity, light and joy. Red symbolizes blood, fire, Christian zeal and the Holy Spirit; blue represents heaven, truth and constancy. The red and blue combines to form violet, a symbol of penitence. mourning and royalty. Green symbolizes life, hope, nature and growth, while gold adds the qualities of glory and splendor to the meanings of white. The different colored lights in stained glass have different properties: white is piercing, blue is luminous and expansive, red contracts at a distance and gold remains stable. As daylight fades, red will turn black but blue will remain until all the light is gone.

Many years ago, the Rev. Leon Adkins, Sr., pastor at the time, preached a sermon on the rose window. His concluding remarks still hold today: "It (Rose Window) testifies to the central mystery of life - the union of God and man. It radiates the reality of constancy and truth. It radiates the glory of love and suffering which shall bring the Gospel of our Lord into the fulfillment of humanity's direst need and highest hope!"

It is a *NY Times* Bestseller and has received many awards, including being named one of the "Best Book of the Year" by the *NY Times*. Bryan Stevenson was a young lawyer when he founded the Equal Justice Initiative, a legal practice dedicated to defending those most desperate and in need. *Just Mercy* is an unforgettable account of an idealistic, gifted young lawyer's coming of age, a window into the lives of those he defended, and an inspiring argument for

compassion in the pursuit of true justice.

The December/January book study will be on *Crazy Love* by Leslie Morgan Steiner. UMW and the Intersectional Justice Committee have teamed up to pick this book on abusive love out of Steiner's own life.

FUMC SUSTAIN (Soap) Ministry – Soap and other basic hygiene products are not covered by food stamps. Any size donation will help with the hygiene of needy Schenectadians.

Heifer International – "The gift that multiplies." Animals and training in their care are given worldwide. Recipients give the first offspring to someone else, thereby spreading the gift. Any donation is helpful, but you have the option of "buying" specific animals.

<u>Home Furnishings Program</u> of Schenectady County – This organization recycles furniture by giving donated furniture and other household items to people in need, who have been referred by agencies in the county.

<u>Community Breakfast Program</u> — This program is held at our church each Sunday except on the first Sunday of each month to provide a good breakfast and hospitality to the people of Schenectady.

Checks can be made out to FUMC with a notation of the agency to which you are donating. Or you can donate directly to the agency for GE or other matching. Cards, which you can give to the person you are honoring, will be available in Fellowship Hall starting on December 3rd.

► World Communion Sunday Scholarships

Congregations around the world observe World Communion Sunday, usually on the first Sunday in October. According to our book of Discipline, World Communion Sunday "calls the church to be the Catholic inclusive church."

World Communion Sunday as a tradition started in 1934 by a Presbyterian Minister as an attempt to bring the church together in a service of Christian unity. In 1940, it was adopted by the Federal Council of Churches (now the National Council of Churches). It was then promoted as an ob-

servance in Christian Churches worldwide. In the United Methodist Church, World Communion Sunday is one of the Special Giving Sundays authorized by the General Conference. A special offering is received. One half of this offering is designated for World Communion Scholarships. The Board of Global Ministries administers these scholarships. Half of the scholarship money goes to ministries beyond the United States. The purpose of the offering is "to assist racial and ethnic persons pursuing various avenues of ministry."



The General Board of Church and Society calls World Communion Scholarships vital to the church's future, especially for racial and ethnic minority students and international students on graduate and undergraduate levels. It further states that the scholarships provide gifts to students who might not be able to pursue a higher education otherwise.

Leon Adkins Sr., a former pastor of FUMC in the 1940s, was on the staff of the Board of Higher Education and Ministry in the 1950s. He was tasked with recruiting candidates for ministry. It was In keeping with this goal that I was recruited as a suitable candidate following my graduation from Wiley College. Therefore, receiving a World Communion Scholarship made it possible to enroll in Boston University School of Theology, graduating with a Masters of Divinity degree.

World Communion scholars were required to attend a week of orientation in Washington, DC. Arriving in Washington in August of 1957 and joining 26 other recruits from near and distant places, the reality of the extensiveness of our church as a global connection was awesome. They came from Fiji, Tonga, Yugoslavia, Malaya, The Philippines, India, Singapore, Norway, and in the United States: African Americans, Native Americans, Hispanic Americans, Alaskan Natives and places that currently escape my memory. Some of the scholars never returned to the countries that they left behind, many of the countries no longer exist and some have different names and different forms of government. Some have been decimated by upheavals resulting in division and extinction. What they knew as home became only a memory buried in a past impossible to reclaim.

The World Communion Scholarship awarded three wonderful opportunities that shaped my life: 1- Forming bonds of friendship nationally and internationally that exists to this day; 2- Serving The Methodist Church as a Lay Employee for 26 years and 3- Finding a connection with FUMC long before it became a reality.

Thanks to Leon Adkins Sr., his successors and World Communion Scholarships, all fortunate recipients can share in important ministries connecting us to United Methodists all over the world. Countries with Methodist Presidents, Bishops, leaders and citizens who serve in Church and Society creating significant milestones that help shape the Arc of History.



United Methodist Committee on Relief & United Methodist Volunteers in Mission

There is a story that at a time of disaster one governor asked the other, "Have the M and M's arrived yet?" He was referring to the Methodists and the Mennonites. United Methodists are often the first in and the last out of an area affected by a disaster. There is a process for mak-

ing this happen. People eager to volunteer need to understand the process.

First, the bishop in the affected area requests help from UMCOR. Then, an advance team of individuals experienced in logistics, communications, construction, volunteer management, and case management will work with the bishop and his team to plan a strategy. They will plan an approach to distribution of supplies, and deployment of Early Response Teams (ERTs) and Volunteers in Mission (VIMs). ERTs are teams with special training who go in first to clean up an area. They might muck out a flooded basement, clean up mold, etc. They are self-contained groups who do not need the support of the local people. VIMS go in later and work on recovery and rebuilding. This process can take over 10 years.

All groups should be available to listen to the people affected and try to support their emotional needs. People who might not be able to do construction are needed on VIM teams for giving support, being gophers, or perhaps playing with children. There is an organization run by Church of the Brethren called Children's Disaster Services (CDS) which provides special training to volunteers who will work with children after a disaster. Many United Methodists work with this group. (More about that some other time!)

While we are waiting for the invitation for VIMs to go to the Caribbean, there are many other sites in need. Our youth worked on the Jersey Shore and in WV during the past year. More help is needed there as well as in many other places. More information on volunteer opportunities is at:

When? Monday, April 2—Friday, April 6, 2018

<u>Where?</u> Mission Central, Mechanicsburg, PA. Mission Central is a United Methodist depot where disaster recovery supplies are collected from the Northeast before they are sent to those in need. See missioncentral.org.

What will the team do? There are a variety of tasks which include sorting and checking kits like the flood buckets and hygiene kits we have sent. The volunteer coordinator knows that our youth are enthused about the construction skills they have learned and says that springtime will offer an opportunity to use some of those skills. There might be needs in the community of Mechanicsburg. The coordinator suggested that we might want to take ½ day to sight see in the area. We will discuss this.

<u>Where will the team stay?</u> We will stay in Silver Spring Retreat Center (silverspring.org), a beautiful facility1.5 miles from Mission Central. It has 19 beds, another mattress, a full kitchen, a pleasant room with a TV, and meeting rooms. It can accommodate up to 30 people.

<u>What will we eat?</u> We will prepare most of our meals in the retreat center and make bag lunches to take for our work times.

How will we get there? Driving takes about 6 hours. Mechanicsburg is near Harrisburg. After we know who is going, we will decide whether we need to rent a van or whether we have enough cars and drivers.

How much will it cost? We don't have exact figures yet but will keep the cost as low as possible. This should not be difficult as we will do our own meals and the retreat center is very generous.

<u>How can we learn more?</u> Team leaders are Sylvester Doyer and Jan Huston. Let them know you are interested. Applications and more details will be available soon.


