From Our Pastor



I talk a good game about the importance of bodies, the holiness of embodiment, the reality of finitude, self-care, and patience with ourselves. I'm able to talk that good game because I spend a lot of time having chats with myself about those topics, and I need a lot of reminders.

A few days ago I was in one of my favorite places – the middle of a ski slope – when I got a very humbling reminder about the potential downfalls of embodiment. That is, I was in the middle of skiing a beautifully challenging mogul trail when all of a sudden, for no discernible reason whatsoever, my back objected. This would seem much

more reasonable to me if it had happened in the midst of a fall, or some sort of imbalance I overcorrected, but it didn't. One second I was skiing along normally and the next I was standing immobilized trying to decide if I had to call ski patrol to get me down.

I didn't. I managed to get down the slope (phew!), down the mountain (great!), out of my ski boots (ow!), to my car (alright!), and even drove myself home (OUCH!). Then I spent several days horizontal, working with ice packs and heating pads, pain medicine, and very very light stretches.

Here is the crazy and wonderful thing: they worked!! Each day I've gotten noticeably better. Healing has happened much faster than I expected. 5 days post injury I can do anything I want to or need to do, except sit for extended periods. Sitting is definitely still a no-no. That's OK though, I've been told sitting is the new smoking.

In the midst of this temporary pain and limitations, I've found myself with some extra compassion. Even a little bit of temporary pain has humbly reminded me of how many people live with chronic pain, and how much energy that drains from their resources. I've been sending prayers and connecting love to those in chronic pain. Even my minor mobility limits have brought my attention to the physically disabled, and those with regular mobility limitations. The world assume our bodies function, and that's not always true. I've also been sending prayers and connecting love to those with mobility limitations and physical disabilities.

The hardest part for me has been admitting my own weakness. I had to end Bible Study early on Sunday because my capacity had reached it's limit. I've done a lot of work from my couch in the past few days, which meant conversations of why I'm not in the office. I ABHOR admitting my own weakness, enough that some self-reflection is going to be needed in the future on why I hate it SOOOOO much.

Ironically, everyone I've spoken to about my back has responded with compassion, gentleness, humor, and support. Admitting what I can't do has allowed others to step in and help me, and given people ways to connect to me.

Most of you have already learned these lessons, even I've learned these lessons before, but somehow I need them over and over again: human bodies don't always work the way we want them to, vulnerability can be a wonderful gift, we don't have to be able to do everything to be loved. Nevertheless, I'm grateful for a community of God's people who have taught me these lessons again. Furthermore, I'm grateful to know you'll work with me on them again next time, and that you'll let me work on them with you time and time again. This whole embodiment thing – it takes some work.



Super Bowl Sunday has become the 2nd most popular day for eating in our culture (behind Thanksgiving) and is a wonderful time for all of us to remember that there are many in our community who face food insecurity for part of each month. The Schenectady Inner City Ministry (SICM) Emergency Food Program is once again participating in the national Souper Bowl Sunday appeal. 100% of the money raised will help the SICM Emergency Food Program feed those who are hungry in Schenectady County. In 2016, the pantry served over 408,000 meals to over 45,000 individuals, indicating that the challenge of hunger for many people in our county continues. SICM can purchase food from the Northeastern Regional Food Bank for \$.16 per pound, so monetary donations go a long way toward providing food for those in need.



February's Book Discussion

The February/March book study will be on the book entitled *God and Empire: Jesus Against Rome, Then and Now* by renowned biblical scholar John Dominic Crossan, who was the Carl lecture series lecturer here at First UMC this past fall.

From the divine punishment and promise found in Genesis through the revolutionary messages of Jesus and Paul, John Dominic Crossan reveals what the Bible has to say about land and economy, violence and retribution, justice and peace, and, ultimately, redemption. In contrast to the oppressive Roman military occupation of the first century, he examines the meaning of the non-violent Kingdom of God prophesized by Jesus and the equality advocated by Paul to the early Christian churches.

The first-century Pax Romana, Crossan points out, was in fact a "peace" won through violent military action. Jesus preached a different kind of peace—a peace that surpasses all understanding—and a kingdom not of Caesar but of God. The Romans executed Jesus because he preached this Kingdom of God, a kingdom based on peace and justice, over the empire of Rome, which ruled by violence and force. For Jesus and Paul, Crossan explains, peace cannot be won the Roman way, through military victory, but only through justice and fair and equal treatment of all people.

If you don't have a copy of the book from the fall lecture, you can try your local library or see Kevin Nelson (kmichael07@yahoo.com), who will order a copy for \$11. The discussion will take place Saturday, March 24th at 10 AM at church.



When? Monday, April 2—Friday, April 6, 2018

<u>Where?</u> Mission Central, Mechanicsburg, PA. Mission Central is a United Methodist depot where disaster recovery supplies are collected from the Northeast before they are sent to those in need. See missioncentral.org.



<u>Where will the team stay?</u> We will stay in the Silver Spring Retreat Center (silverspring. org), a beautiful facility 1.5 miles from Mission Central. It has 19 beds, another mattress, a full kitchen, a pleasant room with a TV, and meeting rooms. It can accommodate up to 30 people.

<u>What will we eat?</u> We will prepare most of our meals in the retreat center and make bag lunches to take for our work times.

<u>How will we get there?</u> Driving takes about 6 hours. Mechanicsburg is near Harrisburg. After we know who is going, we will decide whether we need to rent a van or whether we have enough cars and drivers.

How much will it cost? Cost will be \$200 for each team member. This will cover lodging, food, transportation, insurance, and admission to the Gettysburg Museum. The youth have been raising money which will be used for many of their expenses. If other people need financial help, talk with Sara Baron, or Sylvester Doyer or Jan Huston.

How can we learn more? Team leaders are Sylvester Doyer and Jan Huston. Applications can be obtained from either of them and are to be returned with a \$25 refundable deposit by Feb. 11, 2018. Full payment is due by March 11. A team meeting will be held in early March.

News from Intersectional Justice

It's a new year, and new social action opportunities are taking place.

On Saturday, January 20th, a group participated with thousands of others from the capital region in the 2nd Women's March. We rallied and marched for women's rights, immigrant rights, racial justice, economic justice, myriad of other justice issues, and smashing the patriarchy. And yes, we got brunch too. ©





On January 23rd, another group followed up our Women's March participation by joining groups from around the state in advocating for an expansion of voting rights, including early voting and electronic registration in order to make it easier for people to register and to exercise their right to vote.

Twice last year, First UMC hosted one of our partners, the Labor-Religion Coalition. Once was for a hearing of the Truth Commission on Poverty, and the second was in order to receive a report on the testimony that the Truth Commission had received during its hearings around the state. This work connects to the work of Rev. Dr. William Barber (many of us read his book, *The Third Reconstruction* last year) and his call for a revival of the Poor People's Campaign that Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., had initiated near the end of his life. People all around the country are now working on this effort, called the Poor People's Campaign: A National Call for a Moral Revival. The work of the Truth Commission and what they learned about the reality of poverty in New York State is feeding into this campaign in NYS. The Labor-Religion Coalition is a key partner in this work, and they led the Capital District launch of this campaign on January 29th. You can learn more about this campaign at the following link: www.poorpeoplescampaign.org. Keep an eye out for further information about how we might be able to participate in this campaign.

On Tuesday, March 13th, we will have the opportunity to participate in the Planned Parenthood Day of Action to advocate for women's reproductive health and healthcare services. If you would like to participate, you can register at: https://goo.gl/57TQKC.

Finally, as we move toward and through the spring, we will have more information about our renewed participation in the Campaign for a New York Health Act and the push for a single-payer health insurance system in NY, including the opportunity to join in their statewide advocacy day on May 29th. For now, the Campaign continues to work on collecting surveys on New Yorkers' health care experiences so that these experiences can shape the campaign and the stories they relate to lawmakers. The campaign staff are specifically looking to faith congregations to help them in expanding the number of people that are reached with this survey. It is recommended that all people working with children and youth take the safe sanctuaries training. It is also advisable for as many people as possible to take the training so that we all will be aware of the procedures to prevent abuse of vulnerable individuals. CANTUS Men's Vocal Ensemble

in Concert Sunday, March 11 3:00 PM

How fortunate we are to have Cantus performing here in March for the second concert in FUMC's current concert series! Cantus, an eight-member men's vocal ensemble, is known worldwide for its trademark warmth and blend and its engaging performances of music ranging from the Renaissance to the 21st century. Cantus has been hailed as "the premier men's vocal ensemble in the United States" (Fanfare magazine) and is the winner of the prestigious Margaret Hillis Award for Choral Excellence from Chorus America. The ensemble performs more than 60 concerts each year both in the United States and abroad as well as in its home of Minneapolis-St. Paul, Minnesota. It has an extensive educational outreach and has released 17 albums on its own self-titled label.

Cantus performs without a conductor. Instead, it is an artist-led ensemble, where each piece performed is assigned to one of the singers to produce. This singer is responsible for establishing the basics of interpretation, leading the rehearsal, and controlling the fundamentals of notes, rhythms, pronunciation, etc. Then the entire group discusses execution of the piece, and by the time it is performed, each singer has had his chance to help build the performance. The performance that you enjoy—whether in a recording or in a live concert—is one that would be entirely impossible without the artistic involvement of the entire ensemble.

Cantus is acknowledged around the world for its programmatic versatility, artistic excellence and charismatic personality. As always at FUMC, the concert is free and the public is invited. So do come to the concert on March 11th at 3:00 pm in the sanctuary and hear them for yourself. You won't be disappointed.

Virgia had a good idea which we will try to follow. She asked that we highlight each special day a week in advance so that people can come prepared with money to put in the envelopes.



Now we have another opportunity!! Sylvester and I are planning an intergenerational VIM team in which people from this church will go to Mission Central near Harrisburg, PA, April 2--6. Many VIM teams have had one or 2 youth on them. But this one will have our own amazing youth group and some of our amazing adults! We will all work together as a team.



Mission Central has a huge warehouse in Mechanicsburg, PA. We expect that one afternoon will be used for visiting Gettysburg Battlefield and its new museum.



We will be staying at Silver Springs Retreat Center. It's located on 7 acres of partially wooded land adjacent to Silver Springs Presbyterian Church in Mechanicsburg, PA. The facility has a large deck and front porch, and a large indoor fireplace. There are also 2 large meeting rooms and six bedrooms. It has a full kitchen which the youth will use to prepare meals for our VIM team. There's also 3 full baths and 2 half baths.




