From Our Pastor



At Church Council in June, Adult Education announced the presenter for our Family Weekend this year: Bishop Susan Hassinger. Many of you probably already know Bishop Hassinger, she was the Bishop of the Albany Episcopal Area (the former Troy and Wyoming Annual Conferences) from 2006-2010. For those of you who don't know her, I'm going to take this opportunity to tell you some of what I know of her.

Bishop Hassinger was elected Bishop in 1996 and served for 8 years in the New England Annual Conference before her retirement. She chose to retire because she felt God calling her to something new, and in her retirement she attended classes to become certified as a Spiritual Director. She also became the Bishop in Residence at Boston University. It was in hearing her story for the first time that I really comprehended that discernment and figuring out what God is calling us to is the work of a lifetime, and doesn't stop at ordination (nor consecration!!).

In 2006, Bishop Susan Morrison needed to step down from active episcopal work in the middle of a quadrennium, and Bishop Hassinger agreed to step in. For me personally, this meant that I was commissioned by Bishop Morrison and sent to my first appointment by Bishop Morrison; and I was ordained and served my first 4 years of ministry under the leadership of Bishop Hassinger. Within the process of ordination, we were expected to attend a retreat with the Bishop. So, in 2009, the one I attended was combined between the former Troy and Wyoming Annual Conferences, held at Sky Lake, and led by Bishop Hassinger directly. I had know her for years, and had incredible respect for her. Yet, it was in that retreat that I realized what her greatest gifts are. Bishop Susan Hassinger is the most impressive retreat leader I have ever had the pleasure of experiencing. She is incredibly well-prepared, and yet flexible. Later, I also experienced her as Bible Study Leader for Annual Conference and was equally impressed. She does her work, and she does it WELL.

So, I am thrilled beyond reasonable measure to once again experience a retreat under the leadership of Bishop Hassinger. She intends to lead us from Micah 6:8 "Do Justice, Love Kindness, and Walk Humbly with God." Her leadership will combine Bible Study with spirituality, activism, and practical concerns. I am ready to geek out and having trouble waiting for the retreat to start.

Now that I've gushed excessively over the leader, let me take a moment to remind you of why we even have a church retreat. While you may expect me to say "tradition" or "because you all said you wanted one," that isn't the fullest possible answer. We have a church retreat so that we can build the kin-dom of God. The church retreat: gives us space for rest and relaxation (Sabbath); gives us time to build deeper relationships with each other; nurtures us in the natural beauty of the earth; lets us play together; engages our hearts and minds together; and thus builds us up as a Body of Christ. The work (and play) that we do together as a Body of Christ, to build the kin-dom, is nurtured by retreating together.

Sky Lake is a handicap accessible facility, and the kitchen staff feeds us incredibly delicious and healthy food with adaptations for special food needs. The retreat facilities include full bathrooms and access to electricity, a labyrinth, a lake to boat in, hiking, games and puzzles, and fireplaces galore. There will be special activities for children and youth, and time for shared worship. With gratitude for the faithfulness of those who came before us, there are also scholarship funds available for those who would like to come but can't afford the costs.

It is deeply good to play and learn together, and we are lucky to have one of the greatest teachers and spiritual leaders to guide us. If you are free August 25th-27th, I heartily encourage you to sign up for the church retreat. (If you want more prodding, ask anyone who went last year!) Come play!!



SICM Summer Lunches: Volunteer for a few hours of fun July 17-21

Schenectady Inner City Ministry (SICM) will again be coordinating summer lunches for Schenectady children. Without this program many kids would not have a midday meal throughout the summer. Lunches are served at sites specifically targeted to reach the largest number of children. At the sites, nearly 100% of the children qualify for free or reduced price lunches when they are in school. The NYS Education Department and the US Department of Agriculture fund SICM's summer lunch program by reimbursing SICM for each meal served. Lunch is available to youth 18 years old and under. SICM expects to feed more than 1000 children per day at 18 different sites throughout the city. Last summer over 34,000 meals were served. The food is prepared at a central location and then brought to the distribution sites where it is given to the children by volunteers. FUMC's week to serve this year will be July 17-21. We will be at the Hillhurst Park, Campbell Rd., Bellevue. Hours to volunteer will be approx. 12:15-2:00. We will have 3-5 volunteers each day. Susan Wolfe Hassinger

Susan Wolfe Hassinger was elected a bishop of the United Methodist Church in 1996. She was the Bishop of the Albany area from 2006-2010.

Bishop Hassinger has worked with congregations and church organizations of various sizes, settings, and racial/ethnic backgrounds in conflict transformation, visioning, team building, and congregational development.

Her training, in addition to extensive work in conflict transformation, has included organizational development, family systems as applied to groups and organizations, anti-racism and white privilege, and leadership for change. Bishop Hassinger has also facilitated groups, including the annual conference, in processes of decision-making in addition to or instead of parliamentary procedure. Her practice of spiritual discernment with individuals and groups draws on the "holy conferencing" of John Wesley, as well as such diverse perspectives as the Quaker clearness committee and the Ignatian spiritual exercises.

Bishop Hassinger has been part of the design team and was the first president of JustPeace Center for Conflict Transformation and Mediation. She has also served on a task force on Theological Education and Leadership Formation that included representatives of the Council of Bishops of the United Methodist Church, the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry, and the Association of United Methodist Theological Schools. That task force has produced a working document "A Wesleyan Vision for Theological Education and Leadership Formation for the 21st Century." Bishop Hassinger continues as bishop-in-residence and lecturer at Boston University School of Theology.



From our Intersectional Justice Committee

New York Health Act

A key project of the Intersectional Justice Committee over the past few months has been related to health care and the New York Health Act, which would have created a universal, single-payer health insurance system in the State of New York. First UMC, as well as the Upper NY Annual Conference, supported this Act because we believe healthcare to be a human right, and we believe that love of neighbor means that all members of our congregation, all members of our communities, and all New Yorkers (as well as beyond) should have equal access to quality health care, regardless of financial resources, with the costs born equitably across the state.

The NY legislative session closed on Wednesday, June 21st without passing the NY Health Act. The legislation ultimately stalled in the face of opposition from Senate Majority Leader John Flanagan and the lack of support from Governor Andrew Cuomo; nevertheless, it passed the Assembly for the third year in a row, this time with roughly 2/3 support, and it went from 20 cosponsors in the Senate in January to 31 of the 62 senators at the end of the session—one cosponsor short of a majority.

That is the closest the NYHA has ever come to passage, and it is a major victory in terms of building a groundswell of support toward its ultimate adoption. The broader Campaign for a NY Health Act is already looking toward next year, with an eye toward building even bigger grassroots support. In the fall we will have our own conversation about what kind of role we might want to play in that.

More immediately, our efforts to persuade Senator James Tedisco to become that 32nd Senate cosponsor were not successful. As a member of a Republican party that remains united against this bill, our efforts were always a long shot; nevertheless, he remains the senator for many members of the congregation, so we worked hard to try to hold him accountable to representing us.

Looking more deeply than just whether or not Tedisco supported the Act, we had mixed success with his office. We were never able to meet with Tedisco directly; however, we met with his chief of staff in April and with his legislative policy director in early June. The first meeting felt productive and impactful; the second meeting did not and proved to be a very frustrating experience. We were able to connect with Tedisco's chief of staff, and he acknowledged that Tedisco believes that healthcare is a human right.

However, during our meeting with Tedisco's legislative policy director, he evidenced no knowledge of how the health care system even works, despite Tedisco serving on the Senate health committee, requiring an explanation even of some of our current health system's most basic concepts of regarding how it works before we could talk about how it would work differently under the NY Health Act. Furthermore, he seemed far more concerned about MVP Health Care and the jobs of the people that work there than about the health of Tedisco's own constituents, much less residents of the rest of the state. Furthermore, when a smaller group of those of us who had attended that meeting sought to pull Senator Tedisco out of the then occurring Senate legislative session for a few moments to chat, Tedisco declined even that.


We intend to continue to pursue these efforts in some way and not let Tedisco off the hook, including inviting Tedisco to come out to the church and meet with us himself, so please look for more information on this possible meeting and consider your interest in attending. We do believe in persistence.

July Book Discussion Saturday, July 29

The Intersectional Justice Committee (IJC) continues to invite members of the congregation to participate in book discussions in order to discuss and broaden our knowledge base on a range of

justice matters. The June/July book is *Undocumented: How Immigration Became Illegal* by Aviva Chomsky, and our next discussion will be Saturday, July 29th, at 10 AM. All are invited to join in this conversation.

In this illuminating work, immigrant rights activist Aviva Chomsky shows how "illegality" and "undocumentedness" are concepts that were created to exclude and exploit. With a focus on US policy, she probes how people, especially Mexican and Central Americans, have been assigned this status—and to what ends. Blending history with human drama, Chomsky explores what it means to be undocumented in a legal, social, economic, and historical context. The result is a powerful testament of the complex, contradictory, and ever-shifting nature of status in America.



Immigrants of all sorts are experiencing substantial discrimination in the United States, and a movement is underway and has been pressing the Schenectady City Council since February to declare Schenectady a "sanctuary city" and adopt a series of immigrant-friendly policies. As such, under-

standing the history of "undocumentedness" is especially important and can be a key tool to inform the conversations taking place in our community.

► "Miracle on Craig Street"

HELPING HAMILTON HILL RESIDENTS GROW FRESH FOOD THERE FOR HEALTH

On 1 May last year, Sue Learner delivered a Mission Moment announcement about a Church Retreat at Sky Lake in late August with guest presenter Dr. Sabine O'Hara, Dean of the College of Agriculture, Urban Sustainability and Environmental Sciences at the University of the District of Columbia. Sabine was the wife of the late FUMC pastor, Phil O'Hara.

A week after Labor Day, Sue followed up briefly about the enjoyably relaxing times we spent in the camp setting and the blessing of improved understanding provided by Dr. O'Hara's four sessions' focus on "sustainability," particular to life with and without readily available fresh food in urban settings. Specifically, the sessions guided an increased awareness of how to increase food-security in deficient urban neighborhoods "one city at a time" — and urged responsiveness. We returned with Sabine's challenge and encouragement to apply our new awareness to the conditions in Schenectady.

Several of us soon attended a HUD-sponsored community "needs assessment" exercise, where "food desert" was defined as characterizing the Hamilton Hill neighborhood, one of the city's three. Then, a quiet search began to find appropriate contacts within Hamilton Hill. Inquiry to the Schenectady County Health Services produced a copy of its working-draft plan to combat the local "food desert" issue. This plan, now finalized, seems to aim mostly toward more effectively engaging commercial-scale "local food growers and retailers." The Daily Gazette's editorial on 17 April 2017 about "Schenectady's Food Desert Problem" took a similar slant with ".... lack of a full-service grocery store."

Dr. O'Hara's working examples strongly encouraged steps toward greater neighborhood empowerment in residents themselves producing fresh food – small urban farms of various sorts.

In the meanwhile, Bob Long and I were led to contact Rosa Rivera, a Hamilton Hill resident. Rosa is the full-time leader of the "Miracle on Craig Street" project (MOC) for a big, uplifting goal - - to obtain

the foreclosed Carver Community Center property from the City of Schenectady and reconstitute it as a broad functional base for community activity, including an extensive vegetable gardening program. MOC's website tells the story of responsible young neighbors teaming up to establish a leadership character, set objectives, incorporate legally, obtain office space (with designated hours), and negotiate effectively with the city toward obtaining and redeveloping the vacated property.



THE MOC website outlines an impressive range of support received, financial and otherwise, for its undertaking. Churches, such as First Reformed, Eastern Parkway United Methodist, State Street Presbyterian, Mt. Olivet Baptist, and Universalist Unitarian Society are early supporters. Union College is a basic supporter with many possible inputs as specific opportunities and situations evolve. Other entities are listed as "Partners," and the list grows.

Statement by Rosa Rivera, "Miracle on Craig Street":

Miracle on Craig Street is an all-volunteer run grassroots organization. To date we have 200+ volunteers who have put their hands on this project and donated their time to helping us achieve our vision of revitalizing and re-opening Carver Community Center.

At this time MOC maintains a 2500 square foot organic garden on the corner of Craig and Wiley Street near the Carver Community Center. Our goal is to expand our operation and maintain a large

organic community garden that grows food and teaches our children and families about growing food, nutrition, cooking, and the food system.

We plan to expand to a 5000 square foot community garden in the Hamilton Hill Neighborhood, growing fresh veggies and fruit that will be used for community meals in the neighborhood. The purpose of our place-based garden program, beyond teaching community residents about agriculture, is to create pride and ownership in our community; to us, this means that neighbors and residents have to be at the center of change and ownership in their lives and in their community.

MOC will utilize 35+ volunteers from the community who will help to keep up the garden. We are currently working with 20 volunteers on a weekly basis to water, weed, landscape, harvest, and maintain the garden.

We are seeking support from FUMC for our project to make it a success in the Schenectady Community.

► Summer Lunch Program

I'm going to tell you about the Summer Lunch Program. My goal is to inspire you to volunteer to help for a few hours in July. Schenectady Inner City Ministry (SICM) will again be coordinating summer lunches for Schenectady children. In Schenectady more than half of the youth live below the poverty level and over 80% qualify for free lunch at school. Without this program many kids would not have breakfast or lunch during the summer.

The NYS Education Department and the US Department of Agriculture fund SICM's summer lunch program by reimbursing SICM for each meal served.

In 2016 over 75,000 lunches and 6,500 breakfasts were served in Schenectady and Scotia through the summer lunch program. Lunches are served at sites specifically targeted to reach the largest number of children. At the sites, nearly 100% of the children qualify for free or reduced price lunches when they are in school. Four years ago SICM added a mobile unit. This enabled them to distribute 30,000 meals by stopping at 16 different locations.

Lunch is available to youth 18 years old and under. SICM expects to feed more than 1,000 children every day at 18 different sites throughout the city. The food is prepared at a central location and then brought to the distribution sites. Each site has a site supervisor all summer and rotating groups of volunteers who help serve. This year SICM has a new food distributor – Red Rabbit. Their goal is to expose children to foods they might not otherwise know about. There will probably be more hot foods than in previous years. Instead of packing paper bags for the kids, we will likely be serving foods buffet style. After the children have eaten, volunteers are encouraged to read to them, help them color or play a game. Barb Armstrong usually takes bubbles which kids always enjoy.

Our church's week to serve this year will be Monday-Friday, July 17-21. We will be at the Hillhurst Park on Campbell Rd. in the Bellevue section of Schenectady. I can give you directions to the site. Hours to volunteer will be approximately 12:25—2:00. We will have 3 to 5 volunteers each day. I will have a clip board after the service so that you can start signing up for the day or days that you prefer.


