We'll join our neighbors from Emmanuel Friedens and St. Joseph's for this ecumenical prayer service and to receive blessed ashes as the season of Lent begins. The service will be held on Ash Wednesday, March 1, at 7:00 pm at St. Joseph's Church, just across State St. All are welcome. The ashes are acquired from burning the palms left over from Palm Sunday of the precious year. The ritual traces from the 4th century and by the 11th century is common in churches as a reminder to the faithful of one's mortality and of need to repent and do penance during Lent.

An alternative for imposition of ashes emphasizes a more positive aspect of Lent: "Turn away from sin and be faithful to the Gospel."

From Our Pastor

In the midst of an unsettling time, I have been trying to put some of my focus on things that bring me hope. A few years ago I was prodded by a mentor to "stop being so cynical and focus on the people because there are good people." She was talking about the United Methodist Church and her words ring true for me.

My family became United Methodist without a lot of intentionality about it. My mother was raised in the Congregational Church and my father was raised Roman Catholic. They regularly worshipped together in whatever church felt right. Early in their marriage a landlord invited them to come along to church, and that one happened to be United Methodist. A few years later when they settled in a similar area they sought out a United Methodist Church again. United Methodism worked for me and despite my serious concerns about discrimination and oppression of LGBTQ people, I've stayed.

When asked I always tell people that the best thing about being United Methodist is UMCOR (The United Methodist Committee on Relief) and I have enough data and personal stories to back that up. The truth is that my standard answer breezes over the deeper truths. At this point in my life I am still United Methodist because I have met the most amazing people in the Church. (I'm sure there are amazing people in other denominations, faith traditions, and atheism but I haven't MET them!)

I was sent to United Methodist camp as a child, and I worked at that camp as a young adult. I met amazing people – directors, staff, fellow campers, my own campers. I was raised in a supportive and thoughtful church, and took two Disciple Bible Studies in my high school years, leading to deep and important relationships in my life. I've also been very, very lucky to have been active in Annual Conferences, in the General Church, with the Love Your Neighbor Coalition, to have gone to seminary, and most of all to have served churches full of astoundingly beautiful people who have shared their faith journeys with me.

More people I know and love are United Methodist than aren't. More of the wisdom I've learned has come from United Methodists than from anyone else. More of the laughter in my life has come from jokes made by United Methodists than anyone else. It is perhaps not surprising that I have also fallen in love with a United Methodist as well. (We'd love to have you celebrate with us, more information later in this newsletter.)

As much as I value many view points and many ways of being in the world, if there is a tribe I belong to, it is the United Methodist Church. This isn't really because of polity, theology nor UMCOR. It is because of the bonds of love and life that have formed me into who I am. The greatest hope I have in the world comes from the people I know who are seeking to live GOOD lives of GRACE and ABUNDANCE.

You, FUMC Schenectady, are a constant reminder of reasons to have hope in the world. Your love for each other is inspiring. Your love for the communities that surround you is radical. Your thoughtfulness and desire to learn keep you grounded. Your openness keeps you fresh. The beauty of your space and of the music that fills it keeps us all alive!!!

It is important to be aware of what is happening around us, particularly in order to know where we need to use our power and voices to support those who are being oppressed. However, we also need to be fed by the wonders of love, hope, and joy. You feed me every day. I hope that you will continue to open your hearts to each other so that you too may be fed. There are good people and they are all around you. They're worth knowing even better!

Conversation with the Bishop and other Leaders

The Intersectional Justice Committee has organized a number of events as part of its efforts to provide opportunities for the congregation to live out our faith and engage in justice work. On Sunday, April 2nd, 3-4:30 pm we are scheduled to have an opportunity to engage in conversation at the church with Bishop Mark Webb, the resident bishop of the Upper New York Annual Conference, of which FUMC Schenectady is a part. Additional guests will include Rev. Bill Gottschalk-Fielding, the assistant to the bishop and Director of Connectional Ministries, and Rev. Rich Weihing, the district superintendent for the Albany District.

We are facing a critical moment in the life of the United Methodist Church (UMC). The UMC continues to perpetrate discrimination of LGBTQ persons. This discrimination includes provisions of church law that forbid UMC clergy from officiating at same-sex weddings, forbid UMC clergy from engaging in sexual relationships with partners of the same gender (even when they are married), and forbid the ordination of LGBTQ individuals if they are in sexual relationships with partners of the same gender (again even when they are married). In response, a large movement of United Methodists continue to resist this oppression and refuse to enforce the related oppressive church laws. FUMC Schenectady, as a reconciling congregation, is one such example of the resistance.

This will be a very important opportunity for us to engage in conversation with our conference leaders relating to the above matters, and we need a strong turnout. Please put April 2nd on your calendars.

Eugenia Zukerman is an internationally renowned recitalist and soloist, as well as a writer, artistic director, television journalist, (for which she was nominated for an Emmy), educator and internet entrepreneur (she has created video blogs – called "vlogs," – for many music conservatories and organizations). Early in her career, she won the Young Concert Artists Competition and made her New York debut, which was received with the same kind of rave reviews she continues to get more than 25 years later

During his 50-year career Anthony Newman has come to be known as America's leading organist, harpsichordist and Bach specialist. His prodigious recording output includes more than 200 CDs, including the two recently released CD sets of complete collected organ works and collected harpsichord works of J. S. Bach, 19 CDs in all. He is probably the only world-class musician to have recorded both of these monumental collections. As a keyboardist and conductor he has worked with many internationally-known musicians and symphonic groups. He is a composer, as well, and as such has received 30 composer's awards from ASCAP.

Their program will consist of music for flute and organ duos and organ solos. You can look forward to hearing compositions for the Musical Clock by Bach, Mozart and Haydn as arranged by the performers and the *Fantasy in f minor for Flute and Organ* by Mozart. For organ solos, Mr. Newman will play one of his own compositions, a *Fantasia on the Te Deum*, and Bach's *Toccata*, *Adagio and Fugue in C Major*.

Did you know that the concerts which FUMC offers in its annual concert series are free and open to the public. You are invited and it won't cost you a cent! Come, bring your family, bring your friends, and enjoy an afternoon with two of America's finest classical musicians. We'll see you there!

Good Morning. For those of you who don't know me, my name is Alice Nash. I along with Eileen Deming, are the co-facilitators of the Needlework Ministry. The Needlework Ministry consists of about 15 people, along with wonderful people from other churches locally who have donated to us and a few generous women that I met in an online forum who mailed hats and scarves to us as a mission project from all over the country.

In April of 2013, there was an explosion at the West Fertilizer Company in West, TX. I am a part of a few online knitting forums. One of which, makes prayer shawls and sends them to areas that need them. There was a call put out that shawls were needed for a nursing home in West, TX and to send them to First United Methodist Church in Waco, TX. I felt that this was some-



thing I could help with. I made 7 prayer shawls and mailed them off. A few weeks later, I received a letter, thanking me. I then discovered that their associate pastor wrote a blog post about my donation. After some encouragement from some of you here, I wrote an article for the Spire and offered to start the Needlework Ministry.



Since the beginning, we have donated hats and scarves to the City Mission, baby items to St. Peters Hospital, Albany Medical Center, and Bellevue Women's Hospital, red scarves for Mechanicville United Methodist Church to bring to the Cardiac Center at St. Mary's Hospital in Troy, potholders for Home Furnishings, and winter items went to the Akwesasne Reservation with our V.I.M. Team. We have made prayer shawls for those who are grieving, suffering a loss, going through a hard time, or being confirmed as a Methodist. We

have made baptism shawls for those of us who are being baptized here.

Recently, we delivered 30 hats and scarves to the YMCA Men's Residence. We also provided 78 hats and 29 scarves to the guests of our Breakfast Program.

John Dominic Crossan coming in September!



John Dominic Crossan is coming to First UMC, Schenectady! He will provide two lectures on Saturday, September 23, at 10:00 am and 1:30 pm, with lunch in between. He will preach on Sunday morning, September 24, with a time for engagement in second hour following worship. We are blessed to have one of the world's most significant biblical scholars as our guest lecturer. As usual, we will not keep Dr. Crossan only to ourselves but invite the widest community. You are encouraged to save these dates now and invite others whom you know might be interested.

John Dominic Crossan was born in Nenagh, Co. Tipperary, Ireland, in 1934. He was educated in Ireland and the United States, received a Doctorate of Divinity from Maynooth College, Ireland, in 1959, and did post-doctoral research at the Pontifical Biblical Institute in Rome from 1959 to 1961 and at the École Biblique in Jerusalem from 1965 to 1967. He was a member of a thirteenth-century Roman Catholic religious order, the Servites (*Ordo Servorum Mariae*), from 1950 to 1969 and an ordained priest from 1957 to 1969. He joined DePaul University, Chicago, in 1969 and remained there until 1995. He is now a Professor Emeritus in its Department of Religious Studies.

He was Co-Chair of the Jesus Seminar from 1985 to 1996 as it met in twice-annual meetings to debate the historicity of the life of Jesus in the gospels. He was Chair of the Parables Seminar in 1972-76, Editor of Semeia. An Experimental Journal for Biblical Criticism in 1980-86, and Chair of the Historical Jesus Section in 1993-1998, within the Society of Biblical Literature, an international scholarly association for biblical study based in the United States. He was elected Vice President of that Society for 2010-2011 and President for 2011-2012.

He has received awards for scholarly excellence from the American Academy of Religion in 1989, DePaul University in 1991 and 1995, and an honorary doctorate from Stetson University, DeLand, FL, in 2003.

He has lectured to lay and scholarly audiences across the United States as well as in Ireland and England, Scandinavia and Finland, Australia and New Zealand, Brazil, Japan, and South Africa. He has been interviewed on 200 radio stations, including four times on NPR's "Fresh Air" with Terry Gross. He has been interviewed on television networks in England and the United States by major news agencies as well as on cable programs such as A&E, History, Discovery, and the National Geographic Channel.

He has written twenty-eight books on the historical Jesus, the apostle Paul, and earliest Christianity, and his work has been translated into thirteen foreign languages, including Polish, Hungarian, Russian, as well as Korean, Chinese, and Japanese. Five of those books have been national religious bestsellers for a combined total of twenty-four months. The scholarly core of his work is the trilogy from *The Historical Jesus: The Life of a Mediterranean Jewish Peasant* (1991) through *The Birth of Christianity: Discovering What Happened in the Years Immediately After the Execution of Jesus* (1998), to *In Search of Paul: How Jesus's Apostle Opposed Rome's Empire with God's Kingdom*, coauthored with the archaeologist Jonathan L. Reed (2004).

Along with Marcus Borg, he has co-authored a series of books: The Last Week: A Day by Day Account of Jesus's Final Week in Jerusalem (2006); The First Christmas: What the Gospels Really Teach about the Birth of Jesus (2007); and The First Paul: Reclaiming the Radical Visionary Behind the Church's Conservative Icon (2009).

His most recent publication is *How to Read the Bible and Still Be a Christian: Struggling with Divine Violence from Genesis through Revelation* (March, 2015).
