On October 1st **Harmonic Brass-Munich** will perform in the sanctuary for its tenth time since 1991, and if you haven't included this concert in your weekend plans, do so now and come be a part of the audience. From Our Pastor



During our retreat in August, Bishop Susan Hassinger led us in reflection on the verses, "Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me; for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light." (Matthew 11:28-30)

The passage continued to resonate with me after the retreat, and stick in my thoughts.

It is still there. This past weekend John Dominic Crossan reflected on the first chapter of Genesis, suggesting that it was placed there to indicate that Sabbath - the distribution of rest to everyone – is the beginning of justice which is the foundation of the earth. (I just consolidated two days into one sentence, it isn't exactly verbatim.) Walter Brueggemann's book "Sabbath as Resistance" is an extended reflection on the difference between the culture of productivity and consumerism v. God's call for humanity to engage in regular rest.¹

I've been aware of Brueggemann's theories for a while and able to keep in my mind a contrast between the "ways of the world" (consumerism and productivity) and the ways of God (requiring time for humans to "simply be" and be in relationship with each other). For many years this has helped me to keep balance in my life, in hopes of being a model that life does not revolve around only productivity. What finally clicked into place recently is that the anxiety of the church-at-large, the one that has been fighting back against its own decline in membership and influence, has led to the church-at-large acting more like the world than like God's vision.

The church-at-large often tries to become like a business. The church-at-large deems communities that are growing "successful," implying that Christianity is meant to be in never ending growth (perhaps like the economy?). The church-at-large exists in an ever anxious state, trying to fight for its share of the market, and allowing its anxiety about decline to penetrate every aspect of its life. (It would be easy to keep going, but it isn't my final point.)

Once this became clear, it also became clear that I want no part of it. I believe that God is <u>enough</u>, and has provided enough resources for all of creation to thrive. I believe that God sees each individual as <u>enough</u>, and is able to work with and through all of us toward the kin-dom. Finally, I believe that our community of faith is <u>enough</u>, that God is already at work with and through us to be a gift to our communities.

I know it is easy to get pulled into the anxiety of the church-at-large, and I suspect it is even easier if you remember seeing the sanctuary full on Sundays. It could feel like failure to be smaller than we used to be. It is a loss. However, instead of allowing ourselves to be pulled into the anxiety that suggests we aren't enough as we are, I would prefer that we look around and see the incredible community that is currently present. When we focus on loss we miss the abundance!

There is no doubt in my mind that FUMC Schenectady is enough, today, in its current form. This is a church of abundance: abundant gifts to our communities, abundant opportunities, abundant gifts, and abundant lives! I invite you to join me in considering claiming this statement of faith: God is enough; individually we are enough; together we are enough; we can live out of abundance and leave fear behind. What do you think?

Conversation with Bishop Webb on Discrimination of LGBTQ+ Persons

On Sunday, October 8th from 2 PM - 3:30 PM we are scheduled to have an opportunity to engage in conversation at the church with Bishop Mark Webb, the resident bishop of the Upper New York Annual Conference, of which FUMC Schenectady is a part. Additional guests will include Rev. Bill Gottschalk-Fielding, the assistant to the bishop and Director of Connectional Ministries, and Rev. Rich Weihing, the district superintendent for the Albany District. Originally scheduled to take place in April, this conversation was pushed back due to a scheduling conflict.

As many of you already know, a special session of General Conference has been scheduled for February 2019 in St. Louis. This session will address the escalating tension over The United Methodist Church's (UMC) official policies discriminating against LGBTQ+ persons. This discrimination includes provisions of church law that forbid UMC clergy from officiating at same-sex weddings, forbid UMC churches from being used to hold same-sex weddings, forbid UMC clergy from engaging in sexual relationships with partners of the same gender (even when they are married), and forbid the ordination of LGBTQ+ individuals if they are in sexual relationships with partners of the same gender (again, even when they are married). In response, a large movement of United Methodists continue to resist this oppression and refuse to enforce the related oppressive provisions of church law. FUMC Schenectady, as a reconciling congregation, is one such example of the affirmation of the full worth and value of LGBTQ+ persons, and the Upper New York Annual Conference has repeatedly called for the elimination of discriminatory policies.

As a result of this tension, the 2016 General Conference authorized the Council of Bishops to form what has been called the Commission on a Way Forward. This commission has been meeting over the past year and is working toward developing a proposal for how The UMC can move past this crisis. Their proposal will go to the Council of Bishops next spring, which will finalize and submit it next summer for consideration at the 2019 General Conference.

Organizations on the progressive end of the spectrum, affiliated with the Love Your Neighbor Coalition which advocates for "a just, inclusive and grace-filled denomination," are calling for a proposal for a more just UMC that would end the discrimination against LGBTQ+ persons. On the opposite end of the spectrum, the Wesleyan Covenant Association (WCA) has been organized by a number of "Spirit-filled, orthodox churches, clergy and laity who hold to Wesleyan theology" and "believe change is coming to The UMC" and want to "live into what comes next…" The WCA, in its press releases and organizational statements has demanded that General Conference "definitively resolve our debate over The United Methodist Church's sexual ethics and its understanding of marriage." They have further stated that when that demand cannot be met, the Commission should "prepare a plan of separation" in order to split apart The UMC.

Note that Home Missioner Kevin Nelson co-leads the General Conference strategy team of the Love Your Neighbor Coalition, on which Rev. Sara Baron also serves. Bishop Mark Webb has affiliated with the Wesleyan Covenant Association.

With this context in mind, members of First UMC have the opportunity to engage Bishop Webb in conversation. This conversation affords us the opportunity to hear directly from Bishop Webb regarding his thoughts on the current situation in The UMC and his various leadership roles in relation to that. In addition, we will be able to engage him, Rev. Gottschalk-Fielding, and Rev. Weihing in conversation in which we will be able to share our own thoughts and concerns related to discrimination of LGBTQ+ persons and the future of the UMC.

This will be a very important opportunity for us to engage in conversation with our conference leaders relating to the above matters, and we need you to come and participate. **Please join us on Sunday, October 8th, at 2 PM.** Come prepared to ask questions and share stories about why/how church-sanctioned discrimination of LGBTQ+ persons matters to you, as well as how it impacts you, people you love, and our church community and the manner with which we welcome LGBTQ+ persons into the congregation.



Welcome the Rev. Dr. West "Grace and Race: Intersectionality" Saturday, October 14


Guest speaker, the Rev. Dr. Traci West, will present a program here at First UMC, Schenectady, on Saturday, October 14th, 10 am-1 pm entitled "Grace and Race: Intersectionality." Everyone is welcome to attend this special program.

As Christians, can we formulate a Christian moral understanding of how racism impacts our community that also allows us to consider intersecting issues of sexuality, gender identity, economics, and religion? What kinds of everyday attitudes and practices undermine anti-racist solidarity in our struggle for intersectional justice in church and society? What kinds of Christian faith resources enable an intersectional approach to solidarity and justice? The format will be interactive with a focus on enabling participants to ask questions, practice skills, and develop resources relevant to their own contexts.

Dr. West is the James W. Pearsall Professor of Christian Ethics and African American Studies at Drew University Theological School. She has been an ordained elder in the United Methodist Church for over thirty years. She is the author of Disruptive Christian Ethics: When Racism and Women's Lives Matter, Wounds of the Spirit: Black Women, Violence, and Resistance Ethics, editor of Our Family Values: Samesex Marriage and Religion, and author of many essays on violence against women, racism, clergy ethics, sexuality, and other justice issues in church and society. Her current project focuses on the role of religion and racism in activist strategies to address gender-based violence in Ghana, Brazil, and South Africa and how we, U.S. Christians, might learn from them. She has also been involved in supporting full equality of LGBTQ persons in the UMC, teaching in NJ state prisons, and co-editing the Journal of Feminist Studies in Religion.


HFP will hold a fundraising sale on October 7th from 10–3 during the Upper Union St. Harvest Festival, in front of Gayne Optical.

In March of this year a Volunteers in Mission (VIM) team sponsored by FUMC worked with our missionary, Dr. Belinda Forbes. The team flew in small planes to one of the poorest parts of this beautiful country to work with Accion Medica Cristiana (Christian Medical Action). They helped to build a kitchen for a casa materna which is a place where high-risk pregnant women can safely deliver their babies.

Alternative Giving Suggestions

The Intersectional Justice Committee is encouraging all to consider "alternative giving" for Christmas and other celebrations. Most of us have too much "stuff" while many in the world are suffering without the basic necessities. Alternative (or additional) giving allows us to

honor others by giving a gift in their name to a cause or organization which seeks to improve the lives of others. This year we are focusing on 5 alternatives. Displays will be available at church. <u>Church World Service:</u> Blanket Program— A \$10 blanket supplies warmth to someone experiencing a crisis.

FUMC SUSTAIN (Soap) Ministry – Soap and other basic hygiene products are not covered by food stamps. Any size donation will help with the hygiene of needy Schenectadians.

Heifer International – "The gift that multiplies." Animals and training in their care are given worldwide. Recipients give the first offspring to someone else, thereby spreading the gift. Any donation is helpful, but you have the option of "buying" specific animals.

<u>Home Furnishings Program</u> of Schenectady County – This organization recycles furniture by giving donated furniture and other household items to people in need who have been referred by agencies in the county.

<u>Community Breakfast Program</u> which is held at our church offers every Sunday except the first Sunday of each month to provide a good breakfast and hospitality to people of Schenectady.

Checks can be made out to FUMC with a notation of the agency to which you are donating. Or you can donate directly to the agency. Cards, which you can give to the person you are honoring, will be available in Wesley Lounge on Sundays.

We hope you will consider this meaningful way to share love at Christmas.


