From Our Pastor



I am surprised at the number of times I've been asked if the Bible is true. It is rather a lot. Luckily, my seminary professors prepared me for that one. As I've been trained, I tend to respond, "Some things are true, as in they actually happened, if you had a video camera and you were there, you would be able to capture it happening. Let's call that 'little t truth' because it is truth like we usually think of it. Other things didn't happen exactly as they're written down, but they are written down that way to reflect a Truth that people experienced. This

is how fables, myths, and even parables work. We'll call the things that likely didn't happen, but still point to something that is big and important 'big T truth.' A lot of the Bible is big T truth, even though not a lot of it is little t truth."

Most of the time that works as an answer, and the questions go off in another direction. Really, though, it is an incomplete answer because I'd still like to know which things in the Bible are little t true! Perhaps I should be more at ease with metaphor and meaning than I am, but I still just want to know!

This is why I'm so thankful for the work of the Jesus Seminar. According to their website, "The Jesus Seminar was organized in 1985 to renew the quest of the historical Jesus and to report the results of its research to the general public, rather than just to a handful of gospel specialists. Initially, the goal of the Seminar was to review each of the sayings and deeds attributed to Jesus in the gospels and determine which of them could be considered authentic. Thirty scholars took up the challenge at the initial meeting in Berkeley, California. Eventually more than 200 professionally trained specialists, called Fellows, joined the group at various phases. ... Among the findings is that, in the judgment of the Jesus Seminar Fellows, about 18 percent of the sayings and 16 percent of the deeds attributed to Jesus in the gospels are authentic."

At least as far as the Gospels go, they've done their best work to elucidate which parts are historically true, and why they believe it. One of the scholars of the Jesus Seminar is also a world renowned theologian, John Dominic Crossan. We're thrilled that he will be here giving Carl Lectures on September 23rd and preaching for Homecoming on September 24th. Reading his work has always helped me find words to understand what I think about Jesus and God. One of the books I have appreciated the most is "The Last Week: What the Gospels Really Teach about Jesus' Final Days in Jerusalem" which he wrote with Marcus Borg.² That book helped me understand Palm Sunday, and that has mattered!

It is also a great deal of fun that other groups have decided to be prepared for this exciting visit. The Intersectional Justice Book Discussion will be reading "The Acts of Jesus: What Did Jesus Really Do?" for their September 16th, 10AM book discussion. The "Young Adult" Bible Study will spend four weeks (starting August 27th) studying texts from the perspective of the Jesus Seminar.

Of course, the parts of the Bible that don't point to historical facts still have great value. The ways that the stories are told is always to make points that help people connect to the Divine. There is always a tension to be held between little t truth, and big T truth. Nevertheless, I'm really excited to meet one of my theological heroes and I hope you'll be able to be a part of some of the things we have planned. If not, at least you have some great book suggestions;)




Ten Ways to Fight Hate

from the Southern Poverty Law Center

THE GOOD NEWS IS... All over the country people are fighting hate, standing up to promote tolerance and inclusion. More often than not, when hate flares up, good people rise up against it — often in greater numbers and with stronger voices. This guide sets out 10 principles for fighting hate in your community.

- **1 ACT** Do something. In the face of hatred, apathy will be interpreted as acceptance by the perpetrators, the public, and worse the victims. Community members must take action; if we don't, hate persists.
- **2 JOIN FORCES** Reach out to allies from churches, schools, clubs, and other civic groups. Create a diverse coalition. Include children, police, and the media. Gather ideas from everyone, and get everyone involved.
- **3 SUPPORT THE VICTIMS** Hate crime victims are especially vulnerable. If you're a victim, report every incident in detail and ask for help. If you learn about a hate crime victim in your community, show support. Let victims know you care. Surround them with comfort and protection.
- **4 SPEAK UP** Hate must be exposed and denounced. Help news orga-nizations achieve balance and depth. Do not debate hate group members in conflict-driven forums. Instead, speak up in ways that draw attention away from hate, toward unity.
- **5 EDUCATE YOURSELF** An informed campaign improves its effectiveness. Determine if a hate group is involved, and research its symbols and agenda. Understand the difference between a hate crime and a bias incident.
- **6 CREATE AN ALTERNATIVE** Do not attend a hate rally. Find another outlet for anger and frustration and for people's desire to do something. Hold a unity rally or parade to draw media attention away from hate.
- **7 PRESSURE LEADERS** Elected officials and other community leaders can be important allies. But some must overcome reluctance and others, their own biases before they're able to take a stand.
- **8 STAY ENGAGED** Promote acceptance and address bias before another hate crime can occur. Expand your comfort zone by reaching out to people outside your own groups.
- **9 TEACH ACCEPTANCE** Bias is learned early, often at home. Schools can offer lessons of tolerance & acceptance. Host a diversity and inclusion day on campus. Reach out to young people who may be susceptible to hate group propaganda and prejudice.
- **10 DIG DEEPER** Look inside yourself for biases and stereotypes. Commit to disrupting hate and intolerance at home, at school, in the workplace and in faith communities.

Biblical scholar, author, lecturer, and authority on the historical Jesus and First Century Christianity

Saturday, Sept. 23 — Carl Lectures Sunday, Sept. 24 — Preaching & Luncheon

Dr. Crossan will make two presentations on Saturday, September 23. At 10:00 am he will address the topic, *God and Violence*. At 1:00 pm he will address the topic, *Jesus and Violence*. Lunch will be provided at noon [reservation required for lunch]. On Sunday, September 24, Dr. Crossan will preach at morning worship at 10:00 am and be available for brief dialogue following. Dr. Crossan is currently Professor Emeritus in the Department of Religious Studies at DePaul University, Chicago. Dr. Crossan was Co-Chair of the Jesus Seminar from 1985 to 1996 as it met in twice-annual meetings to debate the historicity of the life of Jesus in the gospels. He was Chair of the Historical Jesus Section in 1993-1998, within the Society of Biblical Literature, an international scholarly association for biblical study based in the United States. He was elected Vice President of that Society for 2010-2011 and President for 2011-2012.

Crossan has written 28 books on the historical Jesus, the apostle Paul, and earliest Christianity, and his work has been translated into thirteen foreign languages. His most recent publication is *How to Read the Bible and Still Be a Christian: Struggling with Divine Violence from Genesis through Revelation* (March, 2015). Between 2002 and 2015, twenty research trips around Eastern Christianity took Dr. Crossan from Byzantine Tiber to Syriac Tigris and Russian Neva to Coptic Nile.

As Christians, can we formulate a Christian moral understanding of how racism impacts our community that also allows us to consider intersecting issues of sexuality, gender identity, economics, and religion? What kinds of everyday attitudes and practices undermine anti-racist solidarity in our struggle for intersectional justice in church and society? What kinds of Christian faith resources enable an intersectional approach to solidarity and justice? The format will be interactive with a focus on enabling participants to ask questions, practice skills, and develop resources relevant to their own contexts.

Rev. West, the James W. Pearsall Professor of Christian Ethics and African American Studies at Drew University Theological School, has been an ordained elder in the United Methodist Church for over thirty years. She is the author of Disruptive Christian Ethics: When Racism and Women's Lives Matter, Wounds of the Spirit: Black Women, Violence, and Resistance Ethics, editor of Our Family Values: Same-sex Marriage and Religion, and author of many essays on violence against women, racism, clergy ethics, sexuality, and other justice issues in church and society.

Discussion on September 16th


Regarding the stories about Jesus feeding the five thousand and Jesus walking on water across the Sea of Galilee...have you ever read such stories and wondered, "Did these stories really happen?" If so, our September book discussion is for you! For our next book study, and in honor of John Dominic Crossan's visit in September, the Intersectional Justice Committee is inviting the congregation to read, *The Acts of Jesus: What Did Jesus Really Do?* which we'll discuss on Sat., Sept. 16, at 10 am. Dr. Crossan, who will visit the following weekend, is a New Testament scholar, historian of early Christianity, former Catholic priest, and a member of the Jesus Seminar. The Jesus Seminar was a group of 150 critical biblical scholars and laymen who have been foremost.

ars and laymen who have been foremost in the field of historical Jesus research.

Discussion on October 28th

The September/October book study will be on *Deep Economy: The Wealth of Communities and the Durable Future* by Bill McKibben. Bill McKibben is a nationally-renowned climate justice activist and a United Methodist clergy member in New England who was a co-founder of 350.org. In this book, McKibben lays out a vision for how to be a society and a community together that stands as a stark contrast to the bankrupt vision of us as consumers that is provided by Capitalism. To learn more about this alternative vision and the solutions it points us toward in terms of community, local production and alleviation of some of the harmful effects of climate change, please join us in reading McKibben's book!


